JUNIORS HELP THE FRESHMEN

O. A. C. DORMITORY INTRODUCES NEW PLAN.

"Big Sister" Movement is Put into Practice by "Upper" Girls.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., Feb. 17.—Henceforward the upperclass young women at the Oregon Agricultural college will make it their particular business to look after the interests and welfare of the freshmen in the girls' dormitory, Waldo Hall.

As the seniors in eastern colleges each choose a freshman to whom the part of temporary guardian is played, so each junior girl at O. A. C. has adopted a freshman. The "Rookerie" will be guarded from unhappy mistakes, her class standings will be watched that she may not fall behind and be "conditioned" or "falled" at the end of the semester, and the girl in "locopartitis" will see that her protegee is not neglected socially.

Educational Statistics Show Conditions Elsewhere.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., Feb. 17.—That the Oregon Agricultural college is keeping abreast with the tide of interest all over the country regarding the winter short courses, is shown in comparative educational statistics given in the biennial report of the regents just published.

The increase at O. A. C. for the biennium in this work, the report says, is something like 40 per cent. At Cornell the enrollment in the winter short course increased from 270 in 1907-8 to 451 in '11-'2. In Ohio state university there were 183 in 1910-11; in the University of Missouri 305 in 1911-12; in California 894 in 1912; in Iowa state college 594 in 1911; in Michigan Agricultural college 321; in Kansas 474; in Purdue University in 1910-11, 1463, of which about 1300 were in the farmers' week.

So much importance is attached to the work in Missouri that the legislature was asked for an appropriation of \$20,000 a year to cover the expense of these winter courses.

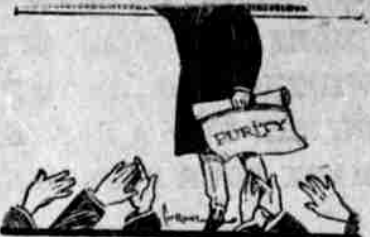
