**SAM-O GIVES
PUBLICITY**

BAKER OBTAINS WIDE ADVERTISING.

Industry is said to Bring Desirable
Advertising to City.

(Baker Democrat.)

One of the most important means
of publicity boasted by any city,
town or community is that which it
receives from its manufactured or
natural products which find a mar-
ket in the outside world, and it is
due to many Baker-made articles of
commerce that this city receives
much beneficial advertising. Of
those products which bear the label
of Baker manufacturers, perhaps
none is more widely known, especial-
ly in the state and northwest for that
matter, for its fame is spreading
than Sam-o mineral water, which is

a natural product of Baker and "bot-
tled as it flows from nature's fam-
ous springs."

The Sam-o Natural Mineral Water
company of Baker is owned and
operated by Fuchs Brothers, Isador
and Mose, well known residents, and
numbering their friends throughout
the state, of which they have been
life long residents. The business,
which was started several years ago,
in a small way, when the present
owners secured the springs from
Samuel Ottenheimer and with it hun-
dreds of acres of land in the vicinity,
has grown steadily until now the pro-
prietors have given up their other
business interests to give their sole
time and attention to its operation.

The capacity and equipment of the
bottling plant has been increased
from time to time, and to one who
is not familiar with the Sam-o bot-
tling works a visit there is one of
great surprise. It is fully equipped
with all the latest machinery known
to the bottling industry for in addi-
tion to bottling the famous Sam-o
water itself, the company manufac-
tures a complete line of soda water,
and other carbonated beverages for
which Sam-o is used as a base.

The process of bottling is in itself
very interesting. The plant itself
is somewhat higher than the spring,
which pours the water from the
ground at the rate of 300 gallon a
minute at a temperature of 80 de-
grees Fahrenheit. From here it is
pumped by an electric centrifugal
pump to a large storage tank higher
up, from where it is gravitated back
to the bottling machine, cooling in
the process. The greatest attention
is paid to the sterilization of the bot-
tles, which are first washed in a so-
lution of soda, rinsed automatically
after being thoroughly scrubbed and
untouched by anything save the steri-
lized brush. After draining they are
filled at once and hermetically sealed
by the crowning machine, which
clamps on the metal tops at the rate
of several thousand an hour.

The interior of the plant is at
present undergoing repairs and im-
provements, including painting, and
when completed will make the es-
tablishment as clean and sanitary an
institution as any of its kind in the
country. The machinery and equip-
ment is new and complete and all
possible labor-saving devices have
been installed. One of the most in-
teresting of these is the labeling ma-
chine, which next to a Mergenthaler
linotype is one of the most compli-
cated pieces of machinery ever in-
vented.

The plant, while operated under

the direct supervision of Fuchs Bro-
thers, is in charge of Mr. A. L. Jones,
an experienced man in his line, who
has been here for some time.

Few people realize the importance
of such a mineral spring in this com-
munity, in fact, few know its mag-
nitude or the scope of the industry,
which is making possible under the
development at the hands of Fuchs
Brothers. Its chemical analysis
shows the water to be superior med-
icinally than the water of many noted
resorts which have won fame there-
by. The fame of Sam-o is growing
and the company's business is in-
creasing all the time, and the noto-
riety of the water for many years only
local will soon be familiar through-
out the northwest and eventually its
latitude of fame will be still more in-
creased. At the present time it is an
important Baker industry and more
would realize its importance as a
means of publicity, were they to pay
the place a visit and learn what is
being done.

The next time you take a drink of
