Constantinople, Feb. 22.—While aeroplaning over Fortres Adrianople in a Bulgarian military aeroplane, Lieutenant Nikola, a Russian pilot, was struck by a Turkish shell. The officer was made a prisoner, but it is not known if he was injured.
