HINTS FOR THE BUSY HOUSEWIFE

Knitted Motor Hood That Buttons Round the Neck.



The motor hood shown in the illustration was designed by a woman. At first glance it looks more like the headgear worn by Eskimos than anything else, and it will probably be as popular for skating and cold weather wear as in the automobile. The hood is of knitted material and covers the head completely excepting the face, and front flaps that button up along the sides can be made with eyeholes and breathing holes and pull down over the face if need be. A lower flap can be worn either turned up or turned down and buttoned around the neck, answering the double purpose of keeping the throat protected and preventing the cap from blowing off. There are ear holes in both sides of this headpiece.

Baked Apple Pudding:
 Take a heaping cupful of evaporated apples and wash them thoroughly, as the water they are soaked in is to be used unless the apples are very sour.
 Pour over them a pint of cold water. Cover with plate to keep apples down. Let stand two or three hours. Put layer of well buttered slices of stale bread in bottom of pudding dish, then a layer of apples. Sprinkle bountifully with sugar and grate on nutmeg to

suit your taste or any preferred spice. Then brown the apple and bread last. Now measure the water the apples were soaked in and add enough cold water to make one pint. Pour it over the mixture and cover with plate. Bake in quick oven forty-five minutes. Uncover the last fifteen, so as to brown the top nicely. Serve with sweet cream or ice cream.

Fig Pudding.
 One cupful of molasses, one of chopped suet, one of milk, three and one-fourth of flour, two eggs, one teaspoonful of soda, one of cinnamon, one-fourth teaspoonful of nutmeg, one pint of figs cut fine. Mix together the molasses, suet, spice and figs. Dissolve the soda with a tablespoonful of hot water and mix with the milk. Add to the other ingredients. Beat the eggs light and stir into the mixture. Add the flour and beat thoroughly. Butter two small or one large brown bread mold. Turn the mixture into the mold or molds and steam five hours. Serve with cream or white sauce.

Camphor Soap.
 This soap can be made at home by placing in a double boiler one pound of any good hard white soap with eight ounces of boiling water. Boil until the soap is almost solid. Then add six ounces of olive oil mixed with one dram of prepared camphor.
 Take the mixture from the stove and use an egg beater vigorously until the mixture begins to harden. Then put away in jars.

Stuffed Ham.
 Remove bones from a fresh ham that weighs not over ten pounds. Rub the inside with salt, pepper and sage and fill the space made by removing the bones with a highly seasoned dressing. Fasten together, place in a pan and down and add a little water. Bake, baste often and one hour before serving rub entire surface with sugar. Bake about four hours. Serve hot or cold.

Clam Chowder.
 Fry a large onion in butter, being careful not to burn. When nearly done add six or seven potatoes (cut into dice shape), three pints of boiling water, salt and one bunch of soft chums. Remove the long necks, simmer until the potatoes are soft, then add a quart of hot milk. Stir and pour into tureen that has six large soda crackers on the bottom.

Winter Fruit Salad.
 Take equal parts of peeled, seeded white grapes, sliced canned peaches and Hawaiian sliced tinned pineapple, cut in small bits. Arrange beds of lettuce leaves on the salad plates and mounds of each separate fruit upon them. Serve with golden dressing, passed separately.

Coffee Stains.
 To remove coffee stains from silk, satin or any other material soak in glycerin, then rub gently with a soft cloth. Rinse with warm water, cover with a dry cloth and iron the wet portion until dry.

CHEEEECLOTH FOR TRUCK.
 Better Than Glass as a Shelter For Growing Vegetables.

The past summer, for the first time, I tried cheesecloth shelters in my kitchen garden, says a Country Gentleman writer. Next summer I am going to have more vegetables under cheesecloth, for it is great stuff. Some old boards were lying round--half-inch lumber about eight inches wide. I cut them up into pieces fifteen inches long. Four of these pieces nailed together made a square frame--a box without top or bottom. Over the top I tacked a piece of cheesecloth. There

was lumber for only twenty-four of them, and I put eight over some cucumber plants started in the house, eight over watermelons and eight over muskmelons. Results were most definite. We had cucumbers from the sheltered vines two weeks earlier than usual and watermelons as big as coconuts before plants that were set in the open had formed fruit. The white shelter has a forcing effect and yet permits hardy growth. Cloth has an advantage over glass in that it lets in moisture. It is also a protection against bugs.

When the vines under cloth outgrew the frames I removed them. Just then I was nursing along a dozen eggplants. With bugs dry weather and other disadvantages, it seemed as if they would not live. Twelve of the frames were clipped over these plants, and in two days the effect could be seen in whole, healthy green leaves. Then some brussels sprouts came for transplanting in July, when the sky was like brass. I put them right out as soon as received, with a cheesecloth frame over each, and they grew as if they had been transplanted in a week of rain.

Cheesecloth is cheap. If you buy a bolt of it, about seventy-five yards, it costs about 2 1/2 cents a yard. The coarse, unbleached variety a yard wide is what you want.
