ONLY STRONG ARE ENGINEERS

Spokane, Wash., Feb. 28.—(Special)—Introduction of high-power locomotives in the west is resulting in a shortage of engineers, according to Alan Ballou of Sacramento, California, formerly an engineer with the Wabash railroad.

"Firing one of the big modern engines, the freight haulers, particularly, is such a Herculean task that but few men are physically able to stand the work, and the result is that there are but few of them that can

endure the strain long enough to be promoted to the 'right hand side' consequently the ranks from which the engine drivers are recruited are being rapidly thinned," said Mr. Ballou. "The substitution of oil for coal is relieving the situation somewhat, but there are so many places along the different lines where oil is not available that it does not materially influence the general condition, and several railroad motive power officials have told me in the last year that it is only a question of a short time until securing competent engineers will be a serious problem."

Spokane, Wash., Feb. 28.—(Special) Eastern tourists who heretofore have been "doing" Europe will come west to the mountain and coast regions in large numbers this summer, in the opinion of W. Ralph Eggleston, a retired merchant of Philadelphia, who is in Spokane on his return from California. "The 'See America First' movement is making rapid headway in the east," said Mr. Eggleston, "and this, together with the knowledge of the beauties of the mountains and lakes of the Pacific northwest and the adventures that promise with exploration of the districts off the beaten path, is proving an irresistible lure to globe trotters. It is only in the last few years that people in the east and south have become aware of the wonderful beauty spots in the Spokane country, in Montana, on the coast and in Alaska." Mr. Eggleston and a number of his friends in Philadelphia are planning on an automobile trip next summer through Yellowstone and Glacier national parks, in Montana, on west through the Spokane country, and to Lake Chelan, in central Washington.

BAD CHECK MAN CAUGHT

Man Who Grabbed North Powder Money Is in Limbo.

"Boots" Clark, a young man about 27 or 28 years old, was arrested yesterday by Robert Nelson, being charged with passing two worthless checks on local business places, one at a barber shop for the sum of \$2 and the other at a restaurant for the sum of \$1, says the Baker Democrat. The checks were drawn on the Powder Valley State bank and signed Boots Clark, whether or not "Boots" is his right given name. The checks were returned from North Powder Tuesday, when presented for payment by the local bank where they were cleared. It was stated last evening that effort had been made by Clark to "square" himself by making the checks good.

District Attorney Godwin was out of the city yesterday but the complaint against Clark was drawn up by Attorney James Nichols, acting in his stead. Mr. Nichols, in speaking of the case last evening, said: "The position of the district attorney's office in the case is this: While it would hardly seem justifiable to send the man to the penitentiary for this offense, still Clark is an all-around bad character, and in all probability Mr. Godwin will prosecute the case against him to the end. He will decide that for himself when he returns today. No matter whether he makes the checks good where he cashed them, it will make no difference to the district attorney. Of that I am sure."

Baker Department Store Removed to Spokane.

The passing of a long established and well known local business house was marked yesterday in the consummation of the sale of the stock of the Dean Mercantile company to the S. E. Carr company of Spokane, who will at once remove the stock to that city, says the Baker Democrat.

Dean, the president of the company, has been prominent in local business circles since his location here ten years ago, when he came from Chicago and organized the company that has borne his name. While his plans for the future are not fully decided on, it is more than likely that he will remain in Baker, as he has several local propositions under consideration.
