PLAN GROWS

GREAT ATHLETIC CARNIVAL IN SPOKANE SOON.

Another Link in Northwest Chain of Carnivals is Laid

Spokane, Wash., March 6.—An important link in the chain of Pacific Northwest festivals will be added this summer in Spokane, when residents of the surrounding country will unite in giving a carnival on a scale equal to that of the Portland Rose Festival, Seattle Potlatch and Pendleton Roundup.

One of the principal features announced by a committee of 50 business men will be an athletic tournament, patterned after the Olympic games, in which athletes in all parts of the North America will be eligible to compete for valuable prizes. The carnival will hark back to western pioneer days, too, with a tournament of volunteer fire departments, of which there are scores in the towns of the Spokane country.

Though no name has been selected yet, the event will be known as playtime in the Inland Empire of the Pacific Northwest. In order that the tens of thousands of farmers may participate, the week beginning June 16 has been selected, following the spring planting and preceding harvest.

Business men of Spokane already have contributed \$10,000 to a fund for this year's carnival, and twice that sum will be raised during the next 60 days. Charles Hebbard, president of the chamber of commerce, states that the carnival will be one of a series of Pacific Northwestern events that serve to effect a closer co-operation between communities, adding:

"We want to make this section the summer playground of America, just as the south is the winter playground. With our carnivals we can accomplish at least two things: first we can make the visits of persons from the east more enjoyable; and second, we can unite the people of our own country in a close bond of unity."

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
