a time warrants, as may be issued and not yet redeemed, according to the

provisions in the ordinance, and of such time warrants, shall be paid from the special interest fund created by a special levy for that purpose, which special levies, one for creating the sinking fund of \$5,000.00 above mentioned and the other for providing the interest on outstanding time warrants issued under the provisions of the ordinance, the council is directed and empowered to levy each year until all of such outstanding time warrants are redeemed.

charter than the former one. Except where the charter is copied it amends the charter radically by ordinance—notwithstanding the universally known method of popular election on charter amendments.

Relief asked for by John Mars relative to the matter of transcripts for improvement bonds, was not forthcoming as the committee to which it was referred was not able to give the relief.

Linoleum is to be laid in the water superintendent's office.

The matter of a storm sewer between M and N streets, was referred to the street committee.

The office of a plumbing inspector, as a separate office, provided in a resolution presented two weeks ago may not be created. The committee which had it, was opposed and the council went against it. The office was to be self sustaining at the expense of such people as installed any plumbing. Councilman Fitzgerald, a member of the committee, hadn't been consulted and time was given him to peruse it.

Citizens are bringing complaint to the council relative to the rise and misuse of the city dump grounds. The fire and police committee will investigate.

The old trouble over spring high water from Deal canyon striking Oak street at Pennsylvania, is giving trouble again. Mrs. Baxter last night sent complaint and the city will investigate.

Treasurer Logan is badly wanted at council meetings. The matter of overdrafts of certain improvement funds came up for discussion. Some councilmen failed to see the business methods prompting it but it is pointed out that all improvement district funds are considered in a bulk, so far as the cash is concerned and when one district is unable to take up warrants against it, for want of cash in hand, other funds better provided at the time, are drawn upon. In the end it will all balance up.

The saloon license held by the late L. Remillard has been transferred to R. Kelley, executor of the estate, and the new bonds approved.

The grading of Cedar street between Main and Spring, is causing considerable discussion again as it did last year when the work was advertised and readvertised. A contract was entered into between the city and Contractor Kingsley at that time but approach of winter stopped the work, and in the meantime the property owners have discovered that the original petition did not provide for park strip grading and they want that put into the contract. The street committee now has the matter in hand following the presentation of a petition to that effect last night.
