The early lead and the entire failure, through the first half, of the visitors to find the ring that counts, spelled defeat.

### German Gleanings.

That instruction in domestic science be made compulsory for girls' schools is urged in a petition signed by a large number of women in Berlin.

The German army comprises a total of 655,912 men. Of the 27,037 officers 413 are generals, 635 colonels and 2,367 officers of the hospital corps. There are 531,004 privates.

Berlin has just opened a new hotel with a roof garden restaurant, the first of its kind in Germany. It will command a splendid view on summer nights of the famous Berlin zoo and the brilliantly illuminated environment. The hotel represents an investment of \$2,500,000.

## GAME CODE IS MUCH SIMPLER

UNIFORM DEER LAW FOR ENTIRE STATE IS EARLIER.

Grouse and Deer Can Be Hunted at the Summer Period.

While no bona fide copy of the new game laws have reached La Grande just yet, the contents of the bill are becoming generally known.

The code forbids absolutely the sale of any kind of game or fish. This does away with the period of one month in the fall when ducks may be sold and four months during the winter when geese may be sold in addition to the months for the sale of game fish. It allows, however, the sale of game that has been raised in captivity. This latter practice is being encouraged by the state game department.

Non-resident anglers' licenses are abolished and anyone can fish during

the seasons by paying \$1. The non-resident hunting license is \$10.

A uniform deer hunting law for the whole state is established by the measure, lasting from Sept. 1 to Oct. 31. The law states that three deer with horns can be killed by one hunter during the season. The deer must be tagged when killed and the licenses henceforth will be sold with three tags attached.

The open season for grouse is the same as that for deer.

The duck seasons are more cut up. In Multnomah, Clatsop, Columbia, Tillamook and Coos counties, they may be hunted from September 15 to December 31. The bag limit is 30 in seven consecutive days. The limit was formerly 35 in seven days. East of the mountains the duck season will be from September 15 to February 15.

The trout season remains unchanged, being open from April 1 to November 1.
