friendly feeling prevailing in La Grande towards the company. Iron Coated Wood.

Some of the piles in use in Amsterdam are 300 to 400 years old. That part which is not in the ground is often bored by a pile worm near the surface, but is preserved by driving in nails with very large heads, so as to give the pile an iron coating. This coating is then transformed by the water into a layer of rust, which protects the wood from the pile worm. This process must be repeated every fifteen years.

India's Jungle Fowl.

The jungle fowl of India, from which our domesticated chickens are descended, lay an average of ten eggs a year, and fifteen years is the natural period of their life.

Dingy Towels.

Dingy towels may frequently be restored to normal whiteness by putting in a kettle of cold water, adding white soap shavings and lemon juice and letting come slowly to a boil. Rinse in tepid water, then blue water, and hang in the sun.

Tigers of Siberia.

The long tailed tiger is still found in considerable numbers in parts of eastern Siberia, especially in the Pri-Amur district, and the largest bears are found in the great mountains.

"Vision of Piers Plowman."

The earliest poem of high value which we meet with in modern English literature is the thrilling and mysterious "Vision of Piers Plowman." This poem has been handed down to posterity in not fewer than forty-five manuscript copies. It is almost certain that Langland wrote the first draft of his poem in 1362, rewrote it in 1377 and revised it again, with large additions, somewhere between 1392 and 1398.

A Historic Day For Boston.

On March 17, 1775, there were 13,000 British soldiers in the town and harbor of Boston. During the day they evacuated the town, and all went on board the ships in the harbor, and the continental congress took possession of Boston.
