Book Land As Found In Latest Volumes

A Short List of Some Books of General Interest Recently Added to the Public Library.

Beesley. The loss of the SS Titanic.

A full, graphic and admirably restrained account of the Titanic disaster, written by a Cambridge (Eng.) teacher who was making his first trip to America. A description of the ship's construction and equipment and the incidents of her sailing and of the days at sea precede a detailed account of the collision and succeeding events as she witnessed them or heard them related by other survivors.

EATON. The Oregon system; the story of direct legislation in Oregon.

A presentation of the methods and results of the initiative and referendum, and recall, in Oregon, with studies of the measures accepted or rejected, and special chapters on the direct primary, popular election of senators, advantages, defects and dangers of the system.

MILLS. The spell of the Rockies. These accounts of the adventures of the "Snow Man", as the native population call him, are chosen from an experience covering twenty-four years. They record in entertaining manner studies of the beaver, coyote and other animal life, long tramps

over glaciers, perilous climbs over crags and peaks, and hairbreadth escapes from avalanches and forest fires.

ROBERT. Pocket manual of rules of order for deliberative assemblies. A compendium of parliamentary law, based upon the rules and practice of Congress; and, a simple explanation of the methods of organizing and conducting the business of societies, conventions and other deliberative assemblies.

SOYER. Paper-bag cookery. An explanation of a new method of cooking which does away with frying pans and stew-pans, and is to be commended for its cleanliness, economy and simplicity. Recipes and directions are given, with chapters on the use of the method in the workman's home, in cookery for invalids, etc. The addresses of dealers selling the necessary specially prepared bags appear on the final page.

PROSECUTOR LAW IN MAY

DISTRICT ATTORNEY HAS ONE MORE COURT TERM.

Afer May Sitting in Wallowa He Becomes County Prosecutor.

District Attorney F. S. Ivanhoe will probably be called upon to officiate as "district" attorney for one more sitting of the circuit court in Wallowa. The new law making county prosecutors instead of district attorneys becomes effective the latter part of May but the May term of circuit court in Wallowa sits the second Monday in May so it is probable that the district attorney will have jurisdiction there for the May term. After that date, Mr. Ivanhoe will be officially known as the county prosecutor and will have only Union county in his jurisdiction. As to the situation of successor to Mr. Ivanhoe in Wallowa county, where Governor West must appoint a man to serve the un-

expired term, the Wallowa Sun says:

Just who will be the first county attorney for Wallowa county has not yet been announced. At least two attorneys in the county are after the job, they being O. M. Corkins of Enterprise and W. G. Trill of Wallowa. It is also said that Attorney Schupp of Joseph is out for the job. A salary of a thousand dollars a year will be received by the lucky man. The law does not go into effect for 90 days a trial.
