A new direct telephone line between Enterprise and Flora will be built this summer by the Home Independent Telephone company. The route from the city to Sled Springs probably will be up Trout creek. The new service will be a great convenience to residents of both ends of the county.

Two Chico men had a hair raising experience one evening last week near Prescott, Washington, details of which have come back to the home folks. Will Fine and Charles Flather are the heroes of the adventure. They are in Washington on business connected with Mr. Fine's horse ranch.

The two went to a moving picture show on the evening of the excitement. On their way back, two masked men jumped out from under a bridge and ordered them to halt and throw up their hands. They did so instantly.

The situation struck Mr. Fine as being a bit funny and he broke out laughing, at which one of the highwaymen who carried a revolver started toward the two victims. Flather caught his breath and stammered:

"Don't shoot; I've got my hands up as high as I can shove them."

One robber covered the men with a revolver and the other went through their pockets, finding a plug of tobacco, a Jew's harp, a pipe, a knife and a deck of cards. While the robbers were looking over their spoils, the young men discovered they had been held up by Mrs. Flather and a girl friend.

He will continue the work that his brother has built up, and will undoubtedly give the same careful and thoughtful consideration to all business that has characterized his predecessor.
