MANY NORTH YAKIMA BOYS WILL
TRY OUT.

Northerners Will Train About Seattle
Until Opening Day.

North Yakima, Wash., March 11.—(Special)—Although Manager Geo. Engle of the North Yakima team in the Tri-State league has announced his intention of staying in Seattle until a week before the season opens and picking his players there, there are five North Yakima boys who are confident they can win places on the team when it is brought to this city. Two of them have practically the assurance of Engle that he will sign them: Lon Rundstrom, pitcher, and Johnny Grovers, second or third. Walter Russell, a North Yakima boy who played first for the Yakima Tigers last year, is considered good ma-

terial. The other two are Danny Marks, who pitched for the Moxee team last summer, and Reabe, outfielder in the same organization, who now lives in North Yakima.

Engle has so far signed only four players. They are Matt Stanley, catcher; Bert Duan, pitcher and utility man; Oass, pitcher, and Cassis, shortstop.

Almanacs in Peppy's Time.
The almanacs of Mr. Peppy's time were overwhelmingly of the prognostication order, and he enjoyed them much as we enjoy "Old Moore" now.
