None of the plans presented were just what the board wanted and this resulted in the employment of Mr. Slater to do the work with suggestions from the board as to what was wanted.

A \$75,000 hotel for Pendleton is not only a possibility but a probability. A move is already on foot to construct such a building in the city and it is understood that \$25,000 has already been subscribed to that end. The men who are behind the movement have been working quietly but earnestly and, while they have not proceeded far enough to disclose their names or plans, they are willing to announce their project and to declare their intention of putting it through if possible.

The announcement has been received by the public with great approval for it is generally felt that Pendleton is behind many of her sister cities in the matter of hotel accommodations. There are several hotels here, respectable, decent and fairly well equipped, but they are lacking in the modern conveniences and facilities which characterize such hotels as the Marion in Salem and the Osborn in Eugene.—Pendleton East Oregonian.

Baker Planning Fall Race Meets.

The Baker County Fair association has taken the lead among the cities in the Eastern Oregon-Idaho circuit in making plans for the coming fall, when at a lively meeting of the board of directors at the Commercial club yesterday afternoon Secretary O'Gorman was authorized to correspond with the other associations relative to holding a meeting or representatives of all the organizations here at an early date to outline plans.

The local association took this step because it believes that plans should be made early and possibility of a change owing to the state fair coming late in October and making a difference in securing entries for the track events for the local circuit. In addition to inviting representatives of La Grande, Ontario, Caldwell and Boise, Walla Walla will be asked to join the conference as it may be that arrangements to join the other racing circuit, of which the latter city is a member, may be necessary or an altogether new program outlined. The local association will await reply from the various cities in answer to the secretary's letter before naming the date of the proposed meeting, giving them all a voice in selecting same.

Other fair matters were talked over but the idea of early organization as noted above was the principal matter under discussion. In reply to the requests of a large number of horsemen to use the fair ground track and stables for training, the board gave them permission to do so, refusing, however, to make any expenditure at this time, giving them the grounds as they find them but will not put them in condition free of charge.
