SING GETS DRAW.

Chinese Boy Groggy in Sixth but Al- most Ends Irish Lad in 10th. in Tenth.

(Pendleton Live Wire.)

Billy Gaffney, intermountain featherweight champion, struck the toughest and grittiest opponent of his career last night, when he got nothing but a draw from Referee Asa Thompson of Echo after fighting Sing Hosan, the American-born Chinese sensation, through the fiercest 15 rounds of ceaseless slugging between two little fellows ever seen in this section of the country.

It was a grand contest. Round after round the Irish lad and the Oriental boy traded punches which were delivered with full steam. Every round was a battle in itself. There was no let-up from the first tap of the gong until the third man held up the hands of both men. The fans were kept in a state of intense excitement. Little boxing was apparent.

The contest was waged in such a fashion that the finish left wide room for differences of opinion, and it is certain that if Thompson had given either man the decision, there would have been a rough-house, as each boxer had a big bunch of backers at the close, though open expressions of opinion indicated that a majority favored Sing.

Fans who have seen scores of fights from New York to San Francisco, including championship battles between the light topnotchers, differed radically in their judgments. The common ground of agreement was that it was one of the greatest slugging matches they had ever seen anywhere. Many declared that there are very few men in the ring today who could absorb the punishment which was eaten up by both Gaffney and Hosan.
