WHEAT FEELS BEAR ATTACK

COUNTY HOLDERS SEEM TO CARE
BUT LITTLE.

Onion Quotations Show But Little
Returns in Sight.

There is evidence of further weakness in the eastern and foreign wheat markets as a consequence of this Oregon grain men take an even more bearish view of the situation than they did earlier in the week. At the figures quoted yesterday there seemed to be but a moderate interest in wheat and not much in the way of trade was reported.

The country holders, on the other hand, are paying but little attention to the fluctuations in the distant markets. For the relatively meagre supplies of the cereal that now remain in their hands they are paying but in their hands they are demanding the full prices quoted, and even at those figures they are not pressing their grain on the market. In the country the belief that supplies in all hands will no more than meet requirements during the remainder of the season is said to be generally prevalent.

Flour prices are said to be holding up firmly and trade in the domestic product is of good proportions. Millmen say there is nothing in the situation now to indicate any change in flour values in the near future.

Onion Market Weak.

The onion market, instead of improving, as was expected earlier in the year, appears to be giving way, and for the growers, who have a considerable surplus of their last year's crop still unsold, the outlook is said to be gloomy, as is usually the case at this time of the year, instead of aid-

to be far from encouraging. Since stage of the season, onion prices have been gradually working down. In many cases the growers now are said to be offering good stock at as low as 65 cents a hundred, a price that means practically no profit for the producer of the commodity, yet at that low figure the demand is so meagre that there is very little business passing.
