BOISE FUNDS ARE PROMISED

CLUB COMES THROUGH 1912 WITH A BALANCE.

Financial Statement of Boise Club Is Read and Pleased.

Boise, March 13.—(Special.)—Characterized by enthusiasm and pervaded with the booster spirit was the first baseball meeting of the season, which was held at the Commercial club rooms last night. Almost a hundred of the rabid baseball bugs were in attendance, and the financial end of the Boise club was well in hand before the meeting was over. About \$1500 of the \$4500 required to put the team on its feet financially was raised before the meeting was over, and a finance committee was appointed to raise the rest. The meeting voted to organize the Boise Baseball Boosters, which is to be a permanent organization to promote the welfare of the national game in Boise.

The feature of the meeting was the financial statement for the past year, which was submitted by Louis Roos, secretary of the club. It accounts for every dollar received and expended and gives an accurate account of the season's business. The statement is now public property. Copies of it are in the hands of every member of the finance committee, and every fan has the privilege of examining them. As shown by the statement, the club took in last year

\$17,290.06, and expended approximately \$15,000. Some expenditures have been necessary since the close of the season, and the balance left on hand is \$1299.41.

Statement Well Received.

The statement was read by Mr. Roos at the opening of the meeting, and was the subject of much favorable comment among the representative fans who listened to it. One and all they voted their thanks to the baseball committee and tackled the problem of rebuilding the grand stand and assembling a team that shall put Boise in the pennant race.

With a few good players left on the reserve list and the Spokane Indians to draw from, the situation looks brighter than ever before, and as it was detailed to the fans the enthusiasm waxed warmer and warmer.

The committee had not announced that a subscription list would be started at the meeting, but it was sprung, and sprung with such good results that before the meeting broke up about \$1500 of the necessary \$4500 had been subscribed for. O. G. F. Markhus of the Idaho-Oregon company, started it going with a statement that while he was not yet entirely certain of the amount, he believed his company could be counted on for \$1000. So it went down the line, with here and there a subscriber doubling the donation he had made the year before, until a substantial sum was assured.

Committees Named.

E. Henle, Bradley Sheppard, W. N. Northrup, T. K. Little, Reilly Atkinson, Joseph Perrault, Will Simons, Ellis Werthman and John A. McDewitt were appointed as the finance committee and the committee will commence its labors today.

Charles H. Grout, Leo Sellers and F. C. Greene were appointed a committee to organize the Boosters club, and the work of organizing a club that will be behind the Irrigators through thick and thin will be commenced at once.

President Bossner addressed the meeting, telling something of the prospects for the coming year. He said a number of the players on the reserve list are suffering from attacks of the hold-out disease, but that he expects most of them to be in line before long.

General plans and policies for the season were discussed. The fans were united with one purpose in view, and that purpose is to further the interests of the Boise club. When Max Mayfield the chairman adjourned the meeting, every fan went away feeling that it was for him to do his part toward carrying out that purpose, and it looks good for baseball in Boise.
