His many friends are congratulating attorney Schaupp upon his appointment as county attorney by Governor West. Mr. Schaupp appreciates the compliment very highly from the fact that half a dozen older and more experienced attorneys in this county were also applicants for the position. The appointment takes effect on June 1st and lasts until the next general election, and carries a salary of \$1200 a year.

Under the provision of the law passed by the recent legislature abolishing the office of district attorney and providing for a county attorney in each county, Governor West is making the appointments as rapidly as he can get around to them.

Under the new law the present district attorneys will be county attorneys in their home counties until the next general election.

SAN FRANCISCO CASHIER SHORT

PILLAR OF OAKLAND CHURCH IS BEHIND BIG SUM.

Sick and Disabled and Prosecution Depends on Surety Firm.

San Francisco, March 14.—Charged with being \$100,000 short in his accounts as assistant cashier of the Crocker National bank, Charles F. Baker, a self-made man and a pillar in an Oakland church, is reported to be near death. Whether he will be prosecuted or not, remains with the surety companies, according to Vice President Fagan who stated that the bank was fully covered by insurance. Baker recently taken ill and when a man was placed in his position temporarily, he discovered the discrepancies. He is believed to have speculated in stock as he did not live an extravagant life.

Another Banker Short.

Charged with specific embezzlement of nearly \$2,000 of the bank's funds, Rupert T. Hooper, head of the trust department of the Mercantile National, is being sought by the police. According to John D. McKee, vice president, the actual defalcations will exceed \$14,000, who maintained a fashionable establishment, has a wife and six children.

FENCE LEADS TO SHOOTING.

Vale Couple in Bloody Scene Over a Fence Dispute Yesterday

Vale, March 13.—(Special)—L. R. Culp is in the hospital, and he and Hank McNeese are under arrest as the result of a shooting affair which took place on the Owyhee, about ten miles southwest of Vale, yesterday afternoon. Both men have been bound over to the grand jury.

Culp fenced a road passing through the Huffman ranch, on which he lived, and when McNeese, accompanied by his nephews and C. M. Barton, drove up with their wagons, they were forbidden by Culp to pass through the ranch. Culp notified the men that he would shoot the man who attempted to cut the wire.

Barton cut the wire, whereupon Culp fired upon him, sending a bullet dangerously close to his head, and McNeese, springing from his wagon, opened fire upon Culp. After firing several shots, Culp fell, with a wound through his left leg. McNeese sent a neighbor to see how badly Culp was hurt.

The sheriff's office was notified by telephone and an officer sent to the scene of the shooting, who brought Culp and McNeese to Vale.

Culp is at the hospital and was unable to attend the preliminary examination today, his attorney appearing for him.

Judge Anderson Returns.

Having heard the evidence in three or four local cases before the supreme court, Judge Gustav Anderson of Baker has returned to his home taking all the cases under advisement.

HYDROPHOBIA IN HUNTINGTON

Dairies Supplying Town With Milk Quarantined Yesterday.

Dr. F. T. Notz, county stock inspector, returned last evening from Huntington, where he was called yesterday by the local authorities to take charge of the situation growing out of the hydrophobia epidemic following the infection of a dog last week, presumably infected through the bite of a coyote, according to the doctor's theory.

The result of Dr. Notz's visit was the declaration of a strict quarantine on all canines and the killing of all thought to have been infected, and also a quarantining of 2 dairy farms just outside the city limits of Huntington, where a bull owned jointly by two adjoining dairy proprietors, following several days suffering with the disease, died yesterday afternoon. The bull is said to have been inoculated with the hydrophobia from a dog belonging to the dairy, which in turn had been bitten by the dog that

ran wild last week, causing much excitement.

During the hours between 10 a. m. and 4 in the afternoon the infected animal caused plenty of excitement. And would have run wild and done much damage had he not been firmly tied with ropes. As it was, the dying animal tore up a heavy tub used as a watering trough and otherwise showed violence during the spasms which became more and more frequent and severe until it finally died.

The Huntington authorities have taken stringent measures and every dog appearing on the streets is instantly killed and several valuable canines have thus been disposed of. According to Dr. Notz the condition will probably improve unless the infection is spread to coyotes, a number of which he believes must have taken the disease from the one supposed to have started the trouble.

One of the owners of the two

quarantined dairies peddled some milk in Huntington yesterday but as soon as the conditions were realized, a hurried order was sent out and all such milk purchased by customers was thrown out. There is now a milk famine in the gate city, and the canned article was having a great sale last evening and the local dealers ordering fresh supplies by wire.
