CLERKS FORMING UNION.

Fearing There Will Be No Senatorial Belief, Girls Organize.

Chicago, March 15.—Anticipating a possible unfavorable outcome of the present wage probe of the department stores, girls and women clerks are organizing into a union and will demand higher wages and better working conditions, and depend upon public sentiment for support. Miss McDowell, head of the Chicago University settlement house, is leading the unionization scheme.

A MOVEMENT IN SCALPS.

One of Them, Though, For Good Reason, Was Firmly Fixed.

One day when Professor Powell was hearing the class in anatomy he was describing the manner in which the various muscles of the scalp perform their several functions, says ex-Governor Theodore T. Geer, reminiscence of his schooldays in "Fifty Years in Oregon." To make the subject clearer the professor told the members of the class to move their scalps by aid of the muscles without moving the head and proceeded to lead the way by giving a personal demonstration.

He had a shaggy head of hair and could turn his scalp almost halfway round his head. The success that attended his maiden effort was so astonishingly complete that it brought forth a roar of laughter, in which the professor heartily joined, although his mouth was where his right eye usually was and his ears were under his chin.

When order was finally restored each member of the class tried it, with varying degrees of success. But Tom Niklin's effort was a hopeless failure, although his superhuman attempts to move his scalp were as laughable as Professor Powell's grotesque success had been. Finally, after the poor fellow had made all the oblique grimaces the class could endure, the professor said:

"Thomas, what is the matter with your head?"

"I don't know, sir," replied Tom, "unless I am the only one in the room whose head is so full of brains that they crowd his scalp."

SLEEP OF THE ELEPHANT.

What Little There Is Seems, as a Rule, to Be Taken Standing.

It is doubted whether, in the wild state, elephants ever lie down. Gordon Cumming thought he had found evidence in marks upon the ground that the adult bulls did stretch themselves out at full length for a few hours' rest at about midnight, but he contended that the young and the cows always remained on their feet.

Another authority, Selous, has expressed doubt whether even the old bulls lie down. He tells of one herd that was known to have kept moving and feeding throughout the twenty-four hours. "Except when rolling in mud and water," he says, "it is likely that an African elephant never lies down during its whole life."

However this may be, the most competent authorities seem to agree that this animal sleeps less and more lightly than any other. J. L. Kipling, the father of the writer, estimated the period of slumber taken standing up to average about four hours in the twenty-four, and this estimate has been employed by the son in an amusing passage for one of his stories, "Moti Gaj," which is the story of the elephant as represented as consisting of an hour's fidgeting on one side and a similar period's fidgeting on the other, followed throughout the rest of the night "by long, low, rumbling soliloquies."—Harper's Weekly.

Big Timber of Guiana.

The greenheart of British Guiana is one of the most remarkable and useful trees in the world. Of the three varieties—yellow, black and maintop—all are durable if cut at maturity and grow to such dimensions that logs can be had from eighteen to twenty-four inches square and seventy feet long. Greenheart is one of the eight woods esteemed as first class by the Lloyds and admirable keelsons, piles and other ship timber, as well as submerged piling, dock gates, etc., are made from it. Owing to the great demand for the timbers and the reckless destruction of trees, the government has put a ban on cutting any which will not produce timbers eleven inches square.—Boston Globe.

Thus the necessity of the Berlin doctor getting an American license to practice medicine, will be avoided. He returns tomorrow and on Monday will inoculate a score of patients at Bellevue and Mount Sinai hospitals.

San Francisco, March 15.—With Court Chamberlain Brun, minister of Denmark in this country, planting the Danish flag, Denmark's site at the Panama exposition was chosen this afternoon. The ceremonies were elaborate.
