Better Variety of Vegetables Offered
—Meat Prices Changed Some

SALMON DAY UNOBSERVED
Little attention was paid to Salmon day in La Grande yesterday. The customary amount of fish was consumed by those adhering to Lenten requirements. The dealers have the customary fish meats on hand but no particular ado was made of the day here as it was in Portland and other larger Northwest cities.

Markets have had a quiet week in La Grande. There have been practically no changes of any consequence in any commodity. The expected sugar raise hasn't come, and other commodities continue in the same old rut. Considerable improvement in the lines that hot house people in California have been offering the consumer here has been the rule, and in addition today, fresh juicy hot house radishes from home have been put on the market. It is but a matter of days, anyhow, until out-door and home grown vegetables will be available so that the consumer will no longer have to deal with hot house products that have been shipped long and far. Slight fluctuations in the meat prices have been the chief items of note in the local markets this week.

"STEP RATES"
PLAN RECALLEDWILL BE CALLED IN BY HEAD
CAMP CLERK.

Those Holding M. W. A. New Rate
Must Go Back to the Old.

A question of importance to local Woodmen of America, among the many that have been up for consideration since the decision of courts that new rates cannot apply, is settled in a letter from Head Camp Clerk Davis to Clerk Landrum of the local M. W. A. camp. It touches the step rate plan which many here adopted prior to January 1913, when it was first proposed and prior to its rejection by the courts. The letter in part says:

"All members who are at present holding benefit certificates or paying rates on the Step Rate plan are required to transfer to the old rates. Such transfers must be effected on or prior to assessment No. 285, which is payable to the local clerk on or before April 30, 1913. You are therefore, urged to at once take up this matter with such members, and see that the transfer to the old rates is promptly effected, and that the certificates they hold are transmitted to the head clerk's office to be replaced by certificates in form present in general use. No charge will be made for such exchange of certificates. Rates will not be accepted by the head clerk after assessment No. 284, and if remitted will be returned and the members on whose accounts same are remitted must be placed in suspension. There is but one exception to this rule, viz: Members who are at present insured on Plan 7 and are paying a rate higher than the old rate, may continue thereon, if they so desire."
