EAGLES READY TO ERECT HOME

INCORPORATION AT \$50,000 TO COME AT ONCE.

Building to Be at Least Two and May Be Three Stories 70x110.

WASHINGTON STREET BOOMS
Plans for the erection of a lodge home on Washington is not all that is in store for that street in a building way in the near future. William Allinson, who recently became the owner of the church property at Depot and Washington, is now planning the construction of some sort of a building, the exact nature or the precise date, being as yet undetermined. I have in mind a fancy apartment house with two, three and four room suites," said Mr. Allinson today. "but this is not definite or final. Within a year, something will be built on the place."
Other building activities, not yet public, are contemplated for Washington avenue.

Local members of the Eagles' lodge are to have a splendid home this summer. Appointment of a committee to effect the incorporation of an Eagles' building corporation, incorporated at \$50,000, has been made and a large piece of the stock has already been sold. The lodge has owned a desirable site on the north side of Washington between Fourth and Depot for several years and will erect its home on that property just west of the Blue Mountain creamery building. The price here will be determined later but it will be 70x110 and at least two stories high. If sufficient stock is sold it will go to three stories—with a full basement anyway. First and foremost the building is to afford a home for the lodge, and it is also probable that the main ground floor will have store and office rooms. These details will be worked out when the plans now under course of preparation, are received.

BOISE SELLS PLAYER.

Pitcher Smith of Mediocre Fame Last Year, Brings \$500.

Boise, March 17.—(Special)—Bob Smith, Boise's successful spitball pitcher was sold yesterday to the Chicago White Sox for a consideration of \$500. The deal was closed when President Bossner of the Boise club received a telegram from Chas. Comiskey, president of the Sox, announcing that he had accepted Smith at the price named by Boise.

On Saturday Bossner received a telegram from Callahan, the Chicago manager, asking on what terms an optional deal could be made. Bossner wired that he would sell Smith outright for the figure mentioned above and Callahan grabbed it.

In his telegram asking for terms the Chicago manager said his pitchers started work too early this spring and

have gone bad. From the tone of his message it seems that his need was an urgent one.

Bobby has been playing some winter ball and is said to be in good condition. Though Callahan did not say so in his message, it is inferred from it that he has looked Smith over and is satisfied with him.

While he did not lead the Western Tri-State league last year, Smith showed at least as much class as any pitcher in the circuit. He was the most finished twirler to perform for any of the clubs.

When he was right his splitter was the wonder of the northwest. Seldom is a pitcher seen in the minors who can control the slippery elm article as Smith can.

He came to Boise from Boston, where he had pitched some good ball. He was released to the Boise club to undergo the finishing process. Smith went to California at the close of last season. He rested most of the winter, but has been getting into condition for some time past. He is ambitious to stay in fast company, and there is little doubt that he will be a fixture with the Sox if he takes care of himself.
