### Find High School Is Shory of Funds.

Enterprise, March 18.—(Special)—The county high school fund is about exhausted and the future of the institution is beset with some uncertainties. At its meeting last week the county court found there remained only \$20.50 in the fund and the court announced that it would allow no more bills for supplies. In the future the court decided, any person would sell goods, wares and merchandise of any kind to the high school at his own risk.

Following the meeting of the court, the high school board convened. This board consists of the members of the court, Judge J. A. French and Commissioners L. Couch and W. P. Newby and also Superintendent J. C. Conley and Treasurer G. W. Franklin. The contract obligation of the county to pay teachers salaries for the remainder of the year are recognized by the board. But as there was no money in the high school fund, it was apparent it would have to be taken from some other fund.

Judge French, it was decided, should write to the attorney general for an opinion on this question. There will be some way out of this phase of the matter attorneys believe. But the school is likely to be cramped by lack of supplies.

The suggestion that the county might seek to violate its obligation to maintain the high school for the balance of the year was heard while the

matter was under consideration but no one was found who would be the sponsor for such a policy. District 21 has prepared to establish and maintain its own high school next year, but it is said the law would not permit it to divert any funds to high school purposes now, if the directors were disposed so to do.

The district boundary board met briefly Friday afternoon to consider one petition. No action was taken.

### Lambing Experiment a Great Success.

Lambing on hay, a new departure in Wallowa county, is now under way at several ranches. Results have been more than excellent thus far and the sheepmen making the experiment are satisfied it is a forward step. Little will develop on the ranges until early in April, when the weather should be milder and safer.

Jay H. Dobbin has three bands on hay, one at the E. O. Makin place, one at Fleming brothers, and one at the home ranch. Mr. Dobbin also has one band lambing on the range, on Innahabench, but a return of cold, stormy weather has proved a handicap, where the sheep have had to endure too much winter hardship already.

Fred W. Falconer has one band lambing on his home ranch and one on Carl Whitmore's place. Both are doing fine. Mr. Whitmore and W. A. Jones also have small bands that are lambing. The lambing season for the

700 ewes which Mr. Jones brought from Idaho recently will begin in a few days.

About half as many men are needed to tend a band of sheep lambing on hay, as are needed when they are in the open, on pasture. This is a great saving in wage expense. A larger per cent of the lambs is saved where there is plenty of feed and the ewes are kept in an enclosure.

Three bands of sheep of the D. & M. company were moved last week to the b reaks of Lightning creek, to be turned out. This company has fed 1130 tons of hay during the winter.

C. L. Harshorn also will move his sheep to the range shortly.

### Jennings' Hotel Is Opened.

The enlarged Jennings hotel in Joseph was opened Monday night with a sumptuous dinner set by the proprietor, Frank Stevenson. This was followed by a dance. Mr. Stevenson now occupies the whole building with his hotel. The large rooms on the first floor are used for the office and lobby, dining room and kitchen. The office has been fitted up with comfortable and attractive furnishings, and the whole house is spick and span and as inviting as an experienced hotel man like Mr. Stevenson could make it. The first floor rooms were rented by D. Baughman & Son and by W. L. Mulkey, until the two consolidated into the B. & M. Supply company and moved to new quarters farther up the street.

### Pioneer on Innaha Dies.

John Higgin died last Friday, Mar. 7, at the home of Luther Lloyd on the Innaha where he had lived for 20 years. He had had unusually good health for one of his age, up to two or three years ago, although he had had kidney trouble for considerable time. If he had lived until Thursday, March 13, he would have been 83 years old.

He was born in South Wales, Pembrookshire, England, in 1830, and came to America when he was 21 years old. About 30 years ago Mr. Higgin went to Pine Valley having come to Oregon from Colorado. He remained in Pine Valley ten years and then came to Wallowa county. He was then getting along in years and needed a comfortable home which he found at Mr. Lloyd's, where he remained until his death.

Thus Mr. Higgin was something of a pioneer in the eastern part of the state and was one of the old residents of the county. He had no relatives, at least in this part of the world.

Burial was at the Bridge, Innaha, on Saturday. There was no formal funeral.
