AT PENDLETON.Detail Announcement to Come a Week
From Next Sunday.

With a schedule prepared that gives La Grande eight weeks at home, the directors and managers of the Western Tri-State league have concluded their session at Pendleton where schedule making was the only subject discussed. Transportation saving is the keynote of the schedule. La Grande opens at North Yakima on Tuesday, April 23, Pendleton at Walla Walla, and Baker at Boise. La Grande will spend the first three weeks on the road, the second at Walla Walla, the third at Pendleton and then home, opening here on May 13. From then on the schedule will give La Grande a run of games, all with the idea of keeping down big jumps.

P. A. Foley, president of the club here, returned today from the tiresome session where all that could be done in the time allotted, was the arrangement of the schedule. It will be announced a week from Sunday.

GIMLIN IS WORRIED.

Players Holding Out for Higher Salaries—Pitchers Are Scarce.

The baseball situation in Boise does not suit Dad Gimlin, the veteran leader. He says of his team since his return to Boise from Ogden where he spent the winter:

"The holdout habit has the whole Boise club in its grip," said Gimlin. "I sent contracts to every man on the reserve list, and all but one were returned unsigned. The one exception was not returned at all. It was sent to Woodie."

"All the players are holding out for more money, but I have little doubt they will come to terms. I am not worrying about the players on the reserve list now, but I would like to know where our pitching staff is coming from this year. Last season

we had three first class pitchers in Smith, Mays and Pope. Now all are sold.

"I have little doubt I will find the necessary number of flingers all right, but I don't know now where they are coming from. I am not worrying about the infield. We have Reams for short, and I believe Lundstrum will be back to play third. If he is not I have signed a Stockton boy who is well recommended. If Lundstrum does come I will keep him on third, put the new man at short, and Reams at Second. I am going to play Altermatt in the outfield this year, and will play one garden myself. I hardly think Scott will play ball this year. His position in Salt Lake has become so good that he does not like to leave it."

"I need one more outfielder, but I need pitchers and another catcher more. We still have Taylor to work behind the bat, but we need still another catcher, and at least three good pitchers. First base will be taken care of all right. I have Fred Clark and Cohn has a good man I can probably have if it is a case of need."

Bennett Wins Fight.

After backing and filling for eight rounds, Jockey Bennett came at Sting Hosan like a whirlwind in the ninth and tenth, put him to the mat once, punished him until he was groggy, and was awarded the decision in the fight at Boise Friday, says the Boise Statesman.

The finish came as a surprise. During the early rounds the yellow man had carried the fight to Bennett, and while there was not a great deal of choice, he had the better of the argument up to the time the jockey cut loose.

As the gong rang for the ninth Bennett tore at Hosan, swinging right and left with lightning speed. He literally fought the Chinaman off his feet. With a vicious left swing he put Hosan to his knees. The oriental was down for the count of three. When he came up he seemed to have injured his right leg in the fall and limped about the ring.

"BIG FRENCHY" JAILED.

Well Known Logger Put in Jail and Fined for Being Disorderly.

The city jail last night housed "Big Frenchy," a giant woodsman who is said to have had his weather eye for certain members of the local police department for some time. MOURN LOSSDEATH OF MRS. WORSTELL IS
HEAVY SORROW

Was Member of Famous Ohio Crusade
Under the W. C. T. U.

Few women in La Grande have reached the prominence in fraternal and civic fields that had the late Mrs. Rachel E. Worstell who died Saturday and was buried yesterday from the Christian church. A half dozen associations saw her at their respective heads during her long lifetime in La Grande.

Rachel Elizabeth Smith Worstell was born near Chasternhill, Morgan county, Ohio, March 27, 1854 and was married to Wallace M. Smith Dec. 29, 1874. Mr. Smith died after a long and painful illness in 1889. Born to this union was one son, Willard Smith now of Phoenix, Arizona. Dr. Smith was unable to come, or to be at the bedside of his mother during her long illness, on account of the danger to his own health. A trip into this northern climate, at this time of year would have been practically suicide, and would have been against the express wishes of his mother, but his aid was very substantial and all that a son could be. No boy loved his mother better. She is also survived by one brother and two sisters, a brother and one sister in Ohio, and another sister in Oklahoma.

Mrs. Smith was married to W. A. Worstell June 20, 1891, and came to La Grande Sept. 4, 1891. She assumed Adda B., Bessie and Ralph, all of the duties of mother to Mr. Worstell's daughters and son, Maude T., whom survive her and know how well she done her part. Mrs. Worstell died at La Grande, Oregon, March 15, 1913, and lacked twelve days of being 59 years old.

She lived a Christian all her years having been born of Quaker parents and she was a member of the church by birthright. During the year 1893 she was baptized into the Christian church and became identified with the church.

In lodge work she was an active member and lover of the various lodges and associations to which she belonged, as follows:

Eastern Star, of which she was past matron.

The Rebekahs, of which she was past noble grand.

Womans Relief Corps, of which she was past president.

Neighborhood club, of which she was past president, (literary).

W. C. T. U., of which she was past president. The last named she had been a member of since the Crusade movement in Ohio and took part in the same.

Her sickness covered a period of about six years and she had three cancers removed. Much of her suffering was known only to those nearest her, and never in a complaining way. She was confined to her bed from Dec. 29, 1912 until death came as a welcome release, and during that time her thoughts seemed to be only for the comfort of those about her,

and for her loved ones when she was gone.

Was Past Worthy Matron.

The death of Mrs. Worstell creates the first break in the list of past worthy matrons of the local Eastern Star chapter. Though established over 20 years, being one of the first of the state, the chapter has never lost a past worthy matron until the death of Mrs. Worstell.

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
