LATE MASS AT WALLOWA.
Permission extraordinary obtained from the holy father, permits Rt. Rev. J. F. Murphy to conduct mass at the unusual hour of 2 o'clock p. m. tomorrow afternoon at Wallowa. This very unusual occurrence is permitted by the inability of the divine to reach Wallowa before the regular hour for mass elapses, as he is to conduct Easter mass at Elgin at 10 o'clock. He will catch the train outgoing, and arrive at Wallowa in time to officiate at mass there at two o'clock. Eleven, and under extreme cases, 12 o'clock are the latest hours that mass is permitted without extraordinary permission and this was granted nowhere in Oregon. No doubt will mass be said at such a late hour during the statewide Easter services.
