WALLOWA HAS NO PROSECUTOR

APPOINTMENT OF SCHAUPP IS NOW DENIED.

Governor Meets Opposition in His Promises About Schaupp.

(Enterprise Record-Chief Clerk.)
No county attorney for Wallowa county has been appointed as yet by Governor West. He so stated in a letter to the Record-Chief Clerk, written at Salem, Monday, March 17.

The statement printed in this paper last week that A. W. Schaupp had been named for the office was based on the governor's declaration made Tuesday March 11, of his intention to appoint the Joseph attorney. Then the case of another aspirant for the position was presented for the first time to the governor and he decided to defer making the appointment until he had considered the matter further.

This astonishing turn of events was disclosed yesterday after a week of confusing rumors and reports. First came the Portland evening papers dated Tuesday March 11, telling that Mr. Schaupp had been appointed. These papers reached here Wednesday afternoon. The next day, Thursday, a telegram and a letter from Governor West came to Enterprise indicating that he had made no choice. On Friday the Oregonian arrived reporting Mr. Schaupp's appointment.

In the midst of the confusion the Record-Chief Clerk wrote Gov. West asking if he would be kind enough to set the people of Wallowa county straight on the appointment. His reply follows:

"State of Oregon, Executive Department, Salem, March 17, 1913.

"The Record-Chief Clerk, Enterprise, Ore.:—This is to acknowledge the receipt of yours of March 14, and to say that while the law providing for county attorneys does not go into effect until July 1st, and no appointments can be made before that date, I declared my intention of appointing Mr. Schaupp. However, since taking such action, the presentation of the names of other candidates and the desire on the part of this office to make further investigation as to matters having a bearing on the appointment for your county, caused me to open the matter again with a view to giving it further consideration.

The inside history of the matter, briefly, follows: A Joseph minister who is one of Mr. Schaupp's many friends wrote to State Superintendent Sheldon of the anti-saloon league at Portland stating that all the people in the county in favor of law and order had united on Mr. Schaupp and that his appointment should be made at once, as persons hostile to the league were rallying around other attorneys. Mr. Sheldon immediately presented the matter to Governor West. No other application for the office had been received by the governor at the time and he promptly said Mr. Schaupp seemed to be the man, and he would appoint him.

The next day Mr. Sheldon and the governor learned there were other aspirants for the position with strong backing in this county. Gov. West thereupon decided to re-open the case. He telegraphed to Mr. Schaupp to head off a letter promising him the appointment which had been mailed.

Thus the case now stands, with the governor not publicly committed to any candidate. Mr. Schaupp's application and endorsements are before Governor West, as also are the papers of O. M. Corkins, and several other attorneys. The choice probably lies between Mr. Corkins, a personal friend of the governor and backed by very strong recommendations, and Mr. Schaupp.
