Enterprise Boy Saw Inauguration.

(Enterprise Record-Chiefsta'n.)

Irvine French has written his parents, Judge and Mrs. J. A. French, of his visit to Washington to see the inauguration of President Wilson. He is a student at a school at Annapolis, Md., where he is taking a course to prepare him for the examination for admittance into the National Naval academy. He wrote as follows:

"I attended the inauguration on March 4 and I did indeed enjoy my self. I would not have missed it for anything.

"I left here at 6 a. m. and arrived there about 8 o'clock and proceeded at once to Pennsylvania avenue but it was already jammed with people. Finally we got in behind the Princeton students and secured a good place in which to watch Wilson and Taft ride up from the White House to the Capitol, where Wilson took the oath of office. The day was warm and clear as it could be and none was suffering from either the cold or the heat. Being with the Princeton students we were placed so that the President was forced to pass very close and I could see every feature in his and Taft's face. I was very much surprised in Wilson, for I thought he was a young man, but he seemed to be very old, some of his hair being gray. We watched all the high officials pass. Among them were Cannon, Knox, Marshall, General Wood, Bryan and many other famous men.

"We would have got a good place to watch him take the oath of office but a couple of policemen saw that we were not Princeton students and took us out and we could not get with in two blocks of the Capitol, the crowd was so thick. So we climbed a tree and saw Chief Justice White administer the oath of office.

"After Wilson had finished taking the oath of office and had delivered his inaugural address, Bryan rose up to shake hands with him and as soon as Bryan appeared on the platform, that mammoth crowd went wild, and such cheering I never heard. I thought they would shake me out of the tree and it was that way the remainder of the day, for whenever Bryan would appear, it was a signal for general tumult. He received more cheers than Taft and Wilson together. He is a two to one favorite.

"In the afternoon my room-mate, who was with me, and myself bought a box for \$2 and stood on it so we could see over the heads of the thousands of people who thronged the avenue. The parade started at 2 o'clock and ended at 7:15. There were 60,000 militia and 20,000 civilians of which 3000, headed by Murphy were from Tammany hall, in New York.

"The parade was led by General Wood and followed by the President's guard, which was a troop of cavalry magnificently mounted and gorgeously dressed. After them came Taft and Wilson, then came the Culver school, next the cadets from West Point who made a big hit, and then the 'Middles' who made the biggest hit."

Ray Augustus to Play With Bucks.

It has just been returned with his signature.

Augustus was the fastest fielding shortstop in the league last year and saved more than one game by sensational stops. While he was not the heaviest hitter in the team, he batted well over the .250 mark and as a base-runner he was peerless. In this department he excelled all players in the league. He was popular with the fans and they will hail with delight the news that he will come back.

Cottage Grove trees Soon to Present Metropolitan Appearance.

The entire main part of the city of Cottage Grove will soon present as metropolitan appearance as the streets of any city in the valley.

Petitions for the paving of Fifth, Seventh and Eighth streets one block north from Main were allowed at a recent meeting of the council.

A petition was also allowed for hard surfacing Birch avenue from Pacific Boulevard to the West side school house.

STATE FUNDS ARE UNCERTAIN

NOT DEFINITELY KNOWN IS ANY MONEY TO BE HAD.

Secretary of State Rules that 1913 Fairs to Have No Aid at All.

OLD LAW PREVAILS.
State Senator E. E. Kiddle is of the opinion that at the last day of the last legislature, a law was passed which remedied one fault pointed out below and he holds that the old law prevails this year and the new fair law becomes effective next year. The fault did exist, Mr. Kiddle affirmed this afternoon but was remedied at the last moment.

While it has been generally understood that the old laws governing contributions by the state to county and district fairs would remain in force until June 3, 1913, the opinion has been advanced by the secretary of state that no law at all applies this year and Oregon's county fairs will go without assistance. The attorney general has yet to rule on the question.

Pendleton's fair promoters brought forth the opinion noted above, when they wrote to the secretary of state. This is the answer:

Dear Sir—Responding to yours of the 18th respectfully have to advise that house bill 423 as this office understands its provisions supercedes the present laws relating to the holding of district fairs throughout the state as its provisions become operative June 3, 1913. It carries with it a repeal of all the present statutes relating to the holding of district fairs and as such fairs are not held until after June 3 you will readily observe that the provisions of the law will govern the conduct of all county fairs provided for thereunder during the present year.

WHITE SLAVER IS ARRAIGNED

BELIEVED HE WILL WAIVE EXAMINATION.

Federal Official Takes Entire Group of Suspects to Baker.

Federal officials today took the man, girl—and nine-weeks-old babe—who have been confined in the city jail here pending investigation of the sensational white slavery charges against the man, to Baker, where he will be arraigned and she held as a witness. It is believed that Saunders, which is the name he gives, will waive examination and in that event, he will be taken to Portland, at once, and his case disposed of there at a later date, probably in the course of a week or two.

A United States deputy marshal arrived yesterday from Portland but as Baker is the point where federal arraignments out of La Grande take place, he could not leave until this morning.

and 10,000 homes are inundated, with immense damage. Fort Wayne is flooded and the lighting plant out of commission. Marion, Elwood, Broad Ripple, Lafayette, Rushville, Muncie, and Mooresville are partly under water with more or less damage. At Richmond, 20 bridges are gone and many are homeless. At Kokomo the city is flooded by Wildcat creek and 1500 are homeless and half the city of Shelbyville is under water. Logansport is isolated, an dozens of homes are washed away. The residential section of Terre Haute is flooded and railroad traffic is at a standstill.
