Clover Parasite Described.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore. March 26.—Do you know what a hypera punctata is? A. L. Lovett, assistant entomologist of the Oregon Agricultural college experiment state does. He says it is the clover leaf weevil, and he should know, for he is intimately acquainted with all the weevil family.

"The present widespread interest in the alfalfa weevil (phytonomus posticus), has afforded a new incentive for possessing a working knowledge of the insect pests of our two important forage crops, alfalfa and clover," he says. "Because of certain approximate similarities between the clover leaf weevil and the dreaded alfalfa weevil, I have compiled these facts regarding the clover pest."

"The clover leaf weevil is considerably larger than the alfalfa weevil, being about a third of an inch long, compared with an eighth to three-sixteenths of an inch for the alfalfa weevil. The beetle is stout, rather squarely built, oval in outline with a fairly long, thick snout. There are 20 rows of small, deep punctures on the wing covers.

"The half-grown grub is a fairly deep green in color, and the head brown. Down the median line of the back runs a white or pale yellow stripe. The grub feeds in a half-curved position, locating usually on the edge of the leaf. The feeding injury is characteristic. As a rule they feed only at night, lying tightly curled at the base of the plant through the day. Here in the valley, however, during the cooler rainy days of spring, they feed through the day.

"Winter is passed as half-grown larvae, protected by the fallen leaves and earth in the field. These grubs commence feeding in early spring. They are mature in July, pupate and emerge as beetles in August. These beetles deposit eggs about the plants and the young grubs feed until fall. The grubs really damage the first crop of clover materially; the beetles feed quite as readily, and their injury is almost as great on the second crop. Both clover and alfalfa are readily attacked by this pest. It seldom eats down a crop entirely, but often does enough damage to be quite noticeable.

"Ordinarily fungus troubles check this pest before it becomes serious enough to warrant special treatment."
