Federal Bureau Will be Moved. (Pendleton E. O.)

Pendleton is to lose the northwest department of the federal bureau of animal industry which has been located here for the past half dozen years and Walla Walla is to gain it. An order was received this morning by Dr. Harry E. Pinkerton, chief of the department, to move his office to Walla Walla on the first of next month.

The order came as a surprise to Dr. Pinkerton as he had had no intimation that such a move was being contemplated until yesterday. As an explanation of the order for removal, he is notified that the officials at Washington have decided to consolidate two offices and that hereafter the local chief will have charge of the meat inspection work as well as the field work. Walla Walla has a meat packing establishment and it is probably for that reason that the headquarters are changed to that city.

Dr. W. V. Glassey, one of the deputies who has also made his headquarters here, has as yet received no orders and does not know whether or not he, too, will be removed. Dr. J. C. Wilson, another of the deputies who is now doing some field work in Idaho, has been ordered to Miles City, Montana.

The news of the order will be un-

welcome to local people both because it will remove an important department of federal work and because it will take citizens who have made many friends while living here. The department was located in Pendleton some six year ago at the time when scab was so rampant among the sheep of Eastern Oregon that a quarantine had to be maintained. Dr. S. W. McClure was then in charge and he was succeeded by his deputy, Dr. Pinkerton, when elected to the position of secretary of the National Woolgrowers' association.
