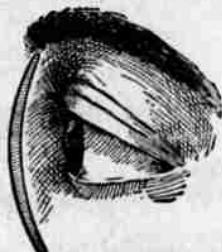

convened a few days ago, the houses of parliament were subjected to a more rigid search and vigilance than they had seen in many generations. Fear of suffragettes caused this surveillance. Cabinet ministers are guarded in their offices, at home and on the streets. "Something awful" that would "stagger humanity" was the promise of the militants for the new parliament unless the government put through another franchise reform bill providing votes for women.

Not since the great gunpowder plot of 1605 have the parliament houses been under such vigilant surveillance as since the new parliament met. From nethermost sub-cellar to top-most chamber, the guards overlook no room nor cubby-hole. The police and parliament authorities professed to believe that the suffragettes intended to "stagger humanity" with an attempt to blow up the houses of parliament. They said they were apprehensive that some female Guy Fawkes would try a bomb outrage when the new parliament was convened. And the new precautions did not strike the public as overdrawn.

Apparently the London public has undergone a revolution of feeling on the suffrage question. From the amusement with which the people at first received the suffrage activities because of their novelty, the feeling gradually changed to mere tolerance. But with the bomb incidents, tolerance has become actual hostility. At Hyde Park and Wimbledon recently, the women had their clothes torn from them, their hats torn off and trampled and some of the anti-suffragettes even spit in their faces.

Home Secretary McKenna has caused the councillors to prepare several new bills relating to the suffragettes to be introduced in this parliament. The home office proposes to give the courts power to punish the militants more drastically than is possible under the present laws which contemplated no such outbreaks as have shattered the peace of the island. The home secretary has conferred much with King George and it is supposed the King and Queen are suggesting many of the steps the government is taking to combat the spirit of violence that has been making England uneasy if not fearful.

RED TAPE AND A BATH.

Curious Experience of a Visitor in a Little French Town.

St. Lo, a little town in the Manche department in France, has no public bath house such as those found in most French towns and cities, for the public bath in France is yet as it were, in its infancy. The town has a bath, but the 12,000 people who live there think themselves above such a thing as a bath. Visitors can get a bath, it is true, but they must order four liters of water, all that they are permitted, and it is taken to them.

Not long ago a visitor in the town wished to take a bath. He went to the hospital to ask permission to take a bath there, as in Brittany this is the custom in towns where there is no public accommodation. The visitor's request was received rather coldly, and he was told that he would have to make his request in writing to the directors of the hospital. This he did and patiently awaited a response. None came, and the visitor left town.

Two days later the response came and followed him from town to town throughout France, not catching up with him until he had returned to Paris.

The response was as follows: "M. — is exceptionally authorized to take a bath at the hospital on condition that he is able to justify by a medical ordinance that this medication is necessary to his state of health."—Exchange.
