# CREAMERY BUTTER FALLS

FOURTY CENTS STRAIGHT NOW QUOTED ON MARKS

Ranch Butter 40 and 70 and 75 Cents Rhubarb Cheaper.

Creamery butter is down to 40 cents a pound roll. The only difference in ranch and creamery butter now is that by buying the two-pound rolls the farmers' brand comes cheaper by 10 or 5 cents, according to the standard of the butter. Merchants quote both 70 and 75 cents for the two pound ranch butter rolls.

Two pounds of rhubarb for a quarter, a drop from 15 cents straight is about the only other market chances today, and no particular changes are in sight, either.
