FAIR OWNERS MEET TUESDAY

ANNUAL ELECTION OF OFFICERS ON THE PROGRAM.

Important Matters Pertaining to the County Fair to Be Transacted.

Important business matters will come up before the stockholders of the Grande Ronde Valley Fair association when it holds its annual stockholders' meeting in this city tomorrow. Election of officers from president down to succeed the present board is one of the important propositions to come up and it is believed that a large representation will be out. President Richardson and the directors are extremely anxious to have a large attendance present as the work cut out for this meeting is important. The welfare of the county far depends largely on the proper selection of officials to carry out the

arduous tasks which someone of necessity, must carry. is interested to know the results.

Ways and Means Committee Busy.

The ways and means committee will probably have the job of appointing other committees during the extra session. It has been made known that the powers in this appointing body do not want to make the appointments at the coming session. They realize, reasonably enough, that when they name the committees they will only be storing up a list of new work in the form of immediate bills to be prepared by their appointees. The Democrats probably will demand the appointments.

With reference to the income tax, which is one measure that is assured, much has been said about the probability of an inheritance tax also. There is a strong sentiment in favor of the passage of a levy on inheritances, due to the fact that the income tax is not adequate to produce sufficient revenue.

About twenty years ago the Democrats passed an income tax law, but it was declared unconstitutional by the supreme court. The constitution has been amended, and now the tax is constitutional. The plan is to have all incomes of over \$5,000 levied upon. In the minds of those who, on behalf of the government, are turning covetous eyes toward inheritances the tax upon only \$5,000 incomes and over will strike only a comparatively small proportion of the public. The revenue will not be nearly enough, they argue.

The Inheritance Tax.

It is asserted that to take a tithe from inheritance would work no one any injury and would bring the revenue up to the desired volume. This is the way these theorists argue: The inheritance really belongs to no one, since the person who left it is dead and the person to whom it is left has not yet received it nor ever previously possessed it. Thus to take a portion of it away for Uncle Sam's use would be robbing no one, say the inheritance taxers.

There has been a report from a pretty substantial source that powerful interests are preparing to fight the income tax. According to this report, a number of men who possess wealth well up into the millions and who would be separated from big sums of money by the proposed law have combined to launch a lobby against the measure. If such opposition does arise the country will be treated to an interesting controversy.

If a few such obstacles to proposed legislation arise the extra session in all probability will last until fall.

New Men Control House.

With the exception of Champ Clark there are new men in charge of things in the house. Speaker Clark, Jones of Virginia and Talbot of Maryland are the only members who were in congress when the Democrats were in power previously.

Sharing power with Speaker Clark is Oscar W. Underwood, who once was a formidable possibility for nomination as presidential candidate and who is now the leader of the Democracy in the house. Mr. Underwood heads the committee on ways and means and has an effective set of men as his followers in that group, including Francis Burton Harrison of New York, Shackelford of Missouri, Kitchin of North Carolina, Hammond of Minnesota, Peters of Massachusetts, Palmer of Pennsylvania, Ansberry of Ohio, Garner of Texas, Stanley of Kentucky, Rainey of Illinois and Dixon of Indiana. Representative John J. Fitzgerald, chairman of the house committee on

appropriations, is another one of the leading factors in congress. His committee handles the sinews of war for many other committees and for the various departments.

The Appropriation Bills.

There are in particular two big appropriation bills which may come up. It is probable, however, that the bills will not formally come before the committee, either in the house or senate, as the plan to have Chairman Fitzgerald take one and Chairman Stephens the other and pass it has been strongly supported.

Other Democrats besides Underwood who amount to "some shucks" in the house and who gained their prominence in recent years are:

Goldfogle and George of New York, Kinkead, Hamill and McCoy of New Jersey; Clayton and Hobson of Alabama, Oldfield and Floyd of Arkansas, Baker of California, Taylor of Colorado, Sparkman and Clark of Florida, Adamson, Hardwick and Crisp of Georgia; Buchanan, Sabath and Graham of Illinois; Cullop, Moss, Adair and Barnhart of Indiana; Sherley of Kentucky, Hrusard and Estopinal of Louisiana, McGillivuddy of Maine, Lewis of Maryland, Sisson and Humphreys of Mississippi, Rucker, Lloyd, Hensley and Borland of Missouri; Small, Pou, Page and Webb of North Carolina; Sharpe and Ashbrooke of Ohio, Ferris and Carter of Oklahoma, Johnson and Lever of South Carolina, Moon, Padgett, Sims and Garrett of Tennessee; Beall, Henry, Stayden and Smith of Texas, and Jones, Saunders, Glass, Hay and Flood of Virginia.

During the readjustments that have naturally occurred with the establishment of new members in the senate much has been said recently about the old seniority rule. Those comparatively young, untried, but presumptuous new senators have absolutely disregarded the old conventionality by pushing new men into the important positions and sidetracking certain old warhorses who in former times would have been given precedence.

This overturning of convention is particularly well illustrated in the case of John W. Kern of Indiana.

Senator Kern, whose name was virtually unknown twenty years ago, when Democrats had their say, is now leader of the senate and chairman of the caucus. Others who are ripping up old senate institutions by holding leadership are O'Gorman of New York, Gore and Owen of Oklahoma, Stone of Missouri, Smith of Georgia, Lea of Tennessee, Smith of South Carolina, Chamberlain of Oregon, Shively of Indiana and Pomerene of Ohio.

Much speculation has been indulged in as to whether President Wilson will visit the capitol and give personal advice on legislative matters. President Wilson some time ago expressed his disposition toward adopting that practice, but since then he has got into close touch with members of congress and has learned he can have access to the members before the sessions each day without going to the capitol.

Wilson Favors Currency Laws.

One measure that President Wilson is known to favor particularly for early passage is a new law, or possibly several laws, on the currency. Leaders of congress, however, have expressed the belief that there will be no time to take up the money laws question on account of the tariff. It is feared that if the currency question comes up all the different theorists on the remodeling of money affairs will cut loose and exploit their various beliefs to the disadvantage of the tariff law.

The question of granting or not granting independence to the Philippine Islands is looked upon as a peremptory subject. The last four Democratic platforms have contained planks favoring the liberation of the islands. On the other hand, President Wilson has signified his intention of sending several representatives to the Philippines to personally investigate the conditions there and report to him.

BAKER SHOTS FAIL TO ACT

LOCALS REGISTER 115 OUT OF A POSSIBLE 125 BIRDS

Two New Men Jump to the Front With Excellent Scores Yesterday.

Two black horses jumped to the front in the La Grande Gun club yesterday and helped roll up a score of 115 birds out of 125 in the shoot in the State Blue Rock league. Veterans of the Mackey, Jolly and Crowe type were crowded out when Jake Biever and Roy Forrester killed 23 birds apiece and with Bert Hughes, made three who shot at that splendid pace. Rayburn led the bunch again yesterday with 24, the second successive match to do that trick in and Press Lewis, high man two weeks ago went down to 22 and low man. The score a two points higher than a week ago and one point higher than last Sunday. Eugene and Portland have each made 118, the highest scores so far.

Baker Not in Shoot.

La Grande yesterday shot without a competitor in the Blue Rock league. Baker had only four men out and the artists there are now talking of withdrawing as they are so far behind in their schedule that they deem it hard to catch up.

A message from Baker to that effect today brings discouraging news here, as the high mark set was deemed amply sufficient to have won from Baker.

OVERWHELMING CAMPAIGN ON

Over Five Hundred March to White House This Morning.

Washington, April 7.—Concurrently with the opening of congress a great war began here today. It was the war of womanhood for the right to vote, and suffragists by the hundred were on hand to launch the campaign. The first guns fired were at the mail of President Wilson, which was so heavy that the letter carriers complained of overwork, and telegrams fairly flooded the executive offices. Each of these communications asked, demanded suggested or pleaded that the question of suffrage be taken up by congress.

Before noon, nearly 1000 women were assembled in a downtown theatre where a "rally" preceded the first personal work. After this an informal parade to the capitol was planned, with Boy Scouts in line to help keep order. Then the real campaign began. Senators and congressmen found themselves buttonholed at every turn, and no member escaped. Each was besought to advocate suffrage by voice and vote. This plan, the leaders declared would be kept up regardless of rebuffs. Miss Alice Paul is in charge of the campaign, but national leaders such as Dr. Anna Shaw, Charlotte Perkins Gilman and others will be here at intervals to assist her.

The parade of 531 suffragettes who were accompanied by two bands marched to the capitol from the downtown headquarters and had plenty of police protection. Each wore a sash and carried a flag showing the congressional district she represented. On arriving at the capitol the women were greeted by a committee of congressmen and were afterward escorted to a special senate gallery.
