# MEAT SHOW STRONGER TONE

## PORTLAND MARKET REVIEW SHOWS STRENGTH.

Egg Business Quiet and Butter May Drop Again.

Portland, April 8.—The market review in Portland as seen yesterday here, was:

Purchases of potatoes are being made in the country at the lowest price every known in the Pacific northwest. Fancy eastern Multnomah and Clackamas offerings are being taken in a limited amount at 2 1/2 cents. If there was a fair demand even at that extreme level conditions would not be quite so bad as they are.

Some business is passing with California, with buyers paying the price noted, but the volume is so small that it is scarcely a ripple, as compared with business in that direction in previous seasons at this period.

## Meat Prices Are Higher.

According to announcement issued by Fred Danielson, head of the local house of Frye, there has been a further sharp advance in the price of pork products. The price of mutton has been advanced a cent.

## Egg Market Is Quiet.

Being the first of the week, there was a quiet tone in the egg market for the day. What few sales were reported were at the same figures as on Saturday, candied stock being generally quoted at 20c.

## More Strawberries Ordered.

Another carload of Florida strawberries was due in the local market at noon. The shipment, as with two others previously received, was divided between this city and Seattle. The latest shipment was reported in good condition. The price is generally placed at \$3.25 @ 2.50 a crate.

## Butter to Drop Again.

General forecasts of the butter trade are for a further decline in the price of creamery here within a few days. There is a noticeable increase in the make at all points, and California prices show a further loss.

## "SONG OF THE SHIRT."

It Was the Most Popular Thing Tom Hood Ever Wrote.

During his last illness Tom Hood in an idle moment made an imaginative sketch of his own tombstone. He drew himself reclining at full length on a thick slab of stone, on the edge of which in large capitals he wrote, "He Sang the 'Song of the Shirt.'" This was the only inscription, and, as he himself has said, Tom Hood needs no other.

How much he felt and prided himself upon the song by which he became known and loved by millions is shown by this and the following fact: "If I were ennobled these are the arms I should adopt," said he one day, showing a rough vignette to a friend. The sketch contained a very beautiful and pathetic idea. It represented a heart pierced by a needle threaded with silver tears, and beneath was the motto he had inscribed on the imaginary tombstone.

"The Song of the Shirt" appeared in the Christmas number of the fifth volume of Punch. It was unsigned, but every paper in the land quoted it, and it speedily became the talk of the day. Hood himself did not think it very remarkable, but Mrs. Hood had said to him as she folded it for press: "Now, mind, Hood, mark my words, this will tell wonderfully. It is one of the best things you ever did."

Mrs. Hood was right. The song was translated into French, German and Italian. It was printed on cheap cotton handkerchiefs and parodied throughout number.
