STRAWBERRY DEMAND GOOD

LOCAL DEALERS AIM TO HAVE A GOOD SUPPLY SATURDAY.

Lemons, Though High, Come in Fairly Good Condition.

Enthusiasm by the quality of stock shipped and the ready sales registered, La Grande grocers are ordering in large consignments of Florida and other Southern point strawberries for the week-end trade. Some of the stores aim to have a mid-week shipment but the big consignments will come at the week end, Friday evening and Saturday morning.

Lemons Remain Good.

Despite disastrous frosts in California, the lemon trade is not seriously hurt as to quality, the 45-cent quotation paying for good quality of stock. Slightly limited, of course, the supply is equal to the demand, the demand being less by reason of the stiff prices necessary.
