NEW POTATOES REACH PORTLAND

ABOUT SEVEN CENTS A POUND IS THE PRICE.

Review of Portland Trade Shows Generally Strong Tone.

Portland, April 10.—(Special)—New potatoes are now arriving rather freely from the south, and there is a smaller demand for the old product. While there is a vast difference in the price of old growth and the newer offerings, still the public is beginning to take to the higher quoted stuff.

Shipments of new potatoes from California have shown a very material increase during the last few days and sales are now being made down to 7c a pound in sack lots. At this time of the season, when prices are so high for new stock, the purchases are mostly in small lots, which are generally quoted today around 7 1/2c.

FARM EXPERT COMING HERE

DR. C. L. SMITH, HORTICULTURIST, TO ATTEND ASSEMBLY

Chautauqua Directors Obtain Stellar Attraction for Farmers.

C. L. Smith, the horticultural expert, who, in the employ of the O. W., has done more than any known factor outside of the Agricultural college at Corvallis to spread the germ of scientific farming, crop rotation and improved farming methods, will spend the entire time of the coming chautauqua in this city, being especially open to consultation with farmers. A series of lectures, round table, informal speeches, and private consultations are slated for Dr. Smith who has consented to become a part of the chautauqua program. This word was brought to the chautauqua directors last evening by George T. Cochran who has been in communication. The scientist-farmer, who emtion with Dr. Smith on the matter employed by a railroad is not a railroad but a farmer of the improved type, will be especially anxious to meet the farmers. He makes a practice of calling on the various districts of his road's territory but seldom favors a community with a stay as long as this one will be.
