GRAPE FRUIT RISES AND ORANGES GO DOWN.

Home-Grown Green Peas Soon to be a Reality in La Grande Markets

California grown green peas went on the market today with fairly good quality of offerings as one of the regular commodities of the spring trade. However, green peas, asparagus tips and the other greens will be produced at or near home soon.

Oranges have dropped a shade, the lowest quotation being 35 cents and the top prices 50c indicating the wide range in quality of stock that is shipped in here. Grape fruit on the other hand, has been exceptionally strong and is now quoted at 2 for 25 cents.

ELGIN'S TEAM HERE SUNDAY

FIRST COMPLETED LINEUP TO BE WITNESSED.

Look 'Em Over Opportunity to Be Afforded for Local Fandom.

Elgin is coming to La Grande Sunday afternoon to play the leaguers, taking the place of the Moose which may hook on at some future date. The Elgin squad is coming down by automobile and it is believed that a large number of fans will also be here to root for Elgin against the fast company the amateurs are going against. This lends added interest to the game here and the weather being favorable it is generally believed that a rousing crowd will be out in full force. For the first time, the team as it is going to look will be worked and the pitchers will necessarily have to cut loose with some pepper as the mighty basemen from Elgin are never to be trifled with. It is likely that Manager King will shove several twirlers against the Elginites Sunday afternoon.

Civil Service Examinations.

The U. S. Civil Service Commission announces that a forest and field clerk examination will be held in this city April 26 1913, for the purpose of securing eligibles from which selection may be made to fill vacancies in the Forest and Reclamation services as they may occur. The salaries paid are from \$1200 to \$1500 per annum. Employment in the Reclamation service will be in connection with the Sun River and Milk River reclamation projects in Montana, probably at Fort Shaw (a camp town on the railroad), at the Sun River Diversion camp, about 20 miles from the railroad, at Malta, Montana (a town of about 800), and at Vandalla, Montana a diversion camp on the railroad. The work will last for two or three years, and capable and efficient employees will probably be in demand for transfer to some other reclamation project when the present work is finished. There are good prospects of advancement, which is conditional only on demonstrated efficiency.
