

# PITCHERS IN TRYOUT GAME

### LOCAL TWIRLERS CARRY BRUNT OF BURDEN.

#### Spuds Trample on Elgin 13-2—Four Pitchers for Spuds.

With cold winds and dust smuffing out all the ginger that threatened to creep out, the Spuds yesterday trampled on the Elgin Braves at the ball park in a 13-2 game. It was a pitcher's battle so far as La Grande was concerned. Chet Luttrell alone cutting any figure in the fielding department. Nazy, a pitout at third, short or sec-

ond and not even an assist! King sent two righthanders and two crooked-arms against the Elgin batters and except for a moment when Mountain was touched for a double and a phoney homer, the home fire squad was never in danger. Pugsley opened it, going three innings of awful good ball, letting the visitors down with two singles—but he lobbed one over to young Blumenstein, a high school boy, just to see him hit and the youngster landed on it for a two bagger. The youth executed a double play later and was an all-around star of the visitors. Mountain followed Pugsley and performed excellently until Patten singled and Oswald drove out a long one good for about two bags, but Oswald cut every bag on the circuit from 15 feet to two feet and romped home in safety.

Moeller, the clever little southpaw took a two-inning whirl at it and

performed in stellar order. He made, perhaps, the best showing of the group, counting contro, hooks and speed. Southpaw Jamieson went over one inning striking out three—all that came up—with traces of wildness.

As a ball game it was not much mustard. Smith beaved for Elgin and kept interest keen, and McInnis went through three innings of excellent pitching against his old-time colleagues, scattering the hits and preventing serious base capers. Oswald then took the mound and with the wildness of a March jackrabbit, walked in runs and made a general basco of the game. The cold wind sweeping over the field slowed up the speed and pep but he fans saw enough of the pitching game to know that there is no serious cause for alarm on that score.

# HIGH SCORES IN STIFF WIND

### ONE FIFTEEN AGAINST BEND FIRST SCORE.

#### Shoot-off Against Troutdale Brings Total of 117 Birds Dead.

Handicapped by a stiff wind which unsteadied the weapons, the blue rock shooters in the state telegraphic league yesterday registered excellent scores. The first official shoot was against Bend in the regular league, a score of 115 resulting. Immediately afterwards, the team shot off the tie score with Troutdale, going to 117 in that event. Hereafter the shooting will occur Sunday morning at 9:30 to avoid the afternoon winds on the new range.

The shooting yesterday was exceptionally good. In the Bend shoot, Press Lewis in the Troutdale shoot went 25 straight. Rayburn, Crowe and Mackey were the high men for the day. In the Troutdale shoot four men tied for fifth place at 22 and in the shoot-off Hunter won. The Bend and Troutdale scores have not been received today.

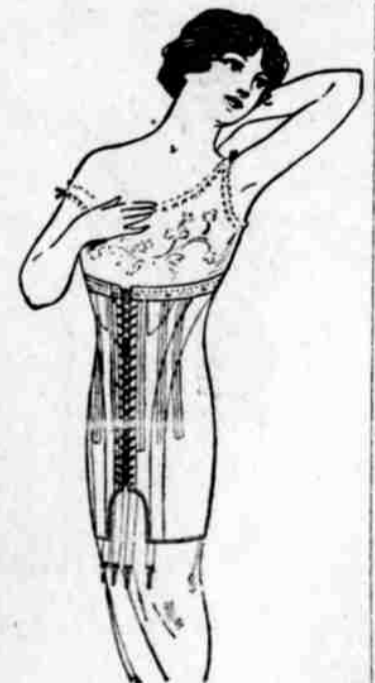
