New Wool Rate April 15.

(Enterprise Record-Chieftein.)

The reduced freight rate on wool
from Wallowa county points to Bos-
ton goes into effect on April 15 ac-
cording to word received by local
shippers and growers. The rate, by
the new tariffs, filed in accord with
the order of the Interstate commerce
commission will be \$1.90 a hundred
on sacked wool against the present
rate of \$2.01. This means an in-
crease of 1-8 to 1-4 of a cent a pound
to the grower. The price at the
market where the produce is sold de-
termines what the grower gets for
practically all the products of the
county. From this market price
must be deducted the freight cost.
Any reduction in freight rates, there-
fore increases the sellers' share of
the price.

G. W. Benson is back home from a
visit to Chicago and other Illinois
cities. Mr. Benson's trip was a mat-
ter of business and he arrived home
earlier than he had expected. He
passed through Omaha twenty hours

George Cook Fined \$18.00

George Cook, employed by the El-
gin Commission company, was ar-
rested Tuesday afternoon by Marshal
Christiansen on a charge of assault
and battery committed upon his
wife.

The row occurred Tuesday noon and
neighbors filed the complaint. Cook
was arraigned before Police Judge
Crum and demanded a trial. He was
accorded the privilege but did not
secure a lawyer. The judge rendered
a verdict of guilty and fined Cook \$18
and gave him a jail sentence of 21
hours.

It appears the trouble arose over
a towel. Cook had performed his us-
ual work at the warehouse and in
handling potatoes his hands and face
had become well covered with dirt.
His wife was washing when he en-
tered the house at noon and had just
replaced the dirty towel with a clean
one. When Cook finished washing
he picked up the clean towel, and
when his wife suggested that he use
another first, the fracas started. Testi-
mony showed that Cook pulled his
wife's hair, dragged her to the porch
and cuffed her in various ways. Her
screams were heard by various neigh-
bors. Cook alleges that he was sim-
ply restraining Mrs. Cook.

This is the same Cook arrested and
fined several months ago for the
same crime.

Another chapter was added yester-
day when Cook was arrested under
a preliminary hearing will probably
be held today.

ELK LEADER CHARGES KEEPER.
