the people of this city at this time is the practice of economy. If we wish to be faithful to our trust it is incumbent upon us to do all in our power to relieve the city from the discredit of being a beggar, when it should be able to hold its head up in the business world and demand par for its paper.

It would seem important at this time to direct your attention to the matter of street cleaning in general.

About one-half the water from our streets goes into the sanitary sewers, there being no storm sewers. This water carries with it, when the streets are flushed with force, the mud and also the sand and scales from the pavement. Part of it settles in the catch basins, but a large percentage of it is carried into the sewers where because of the slight incline most of it settles; a small quantity of the lighter debris being carried to the septic tank.

It can easily be understood that in time—and how long a time required no one can say—the sanitary sewers will be obstructed. In case the sewers were forcibly flushed, as has been suggested, the obstructing mud, etc. might in part be washed into the septic tank, where it would be harmful.

In addition to the danger of obstructing the sanitary sewers by flushing the streets, there is sure to be the positive results of rendering the septic tank inactive.

The efficiency of the septic tank depends on a certain degree of stillness in its liquid contents, as the bacteria on which the destruction of the organic matter depends cannot multiply and carry on their work when such liquid contents are in the state of turbulence which is sure to result from turning into the tank the large quantities of water used in flushing our streets.

The poisonous matter would therefore be carried through the septic tank and would be a continual men-

ace to people living in any territory through which the water carrying it might flow. The state board of health would be sure to take cognizance of this state of affairs; if their attention were called to it, and compel the city of La Grande to properly dispose of its sewage.

As a matter of fact, this condition of affairs has existed for some time. How nearly closed up some of the sanitary sewers are at the present time no one knows.

It is a condition to which this council must give consideration.

Keeping surface water out of the sanitary sewers as much as possible is made absolutely necessary. This can be accomplished to a great extent during the summer months when the septic tank is most needed if the streets are not flushed.

The question of street cleaning must be solved in some other manner than by flushing them with water when there are no storm sewers until the latter shall have been constructed, if the health of our citizens is to be protected.

The city already owns a sweeper which, if properly used, will clean the streets more effectively than can be done by any method of flushing, removing nails and glass as well as lighter accumulations.

By sweeping the streets at night and sprinkling them in the morning and during the day they can be kept in good condition at much less expense than by flushing, and at the same time traffic be less impeded.

For the reasons given above, viz., the financial condition of the city, and because of absence of storm sewers, which latter is considered prohibitory against you are hereby in-

formed that the mayor will not sign a contract for the purchase of a flushing tank, unless directed to do so by an order from the proper court.
