Eucharistic Congress.

Rome, April 26.—Extensive preparations were completed to day for the celebration tomorrow of the fourth elaborate function marking the Vatican's all-year observance of Constantine year. Among the thousands of pilgrims who were in the city today are hundreds of Americans, and efforts are being made by them to be received in the Vatican early next week. The celebration tomorrow will be held at the church of Saint Paul Outside the Walls, which was erected over the spot where the remains of Paul were interred immediately following his martyrdom. Pontifical mass will be celebrated on the high altar under which repose part of the remains, by a cardinal specially designated for the occasion. In ad-

dition to the thousands of pilgrims who will be present, the ceremony will also be attended by all of the members of the religious seminaries of Rome, including 170 students of the North American College under the charge of Monsignor Kennedy. Following the exposing of the remains of Paul, a Te Deum will be sung and the Eucharistic benediction imparted.

National Relay Games Today.
Philadelphia, April 26.—Nearly 2,500 athletes, representing practically every university and the leading colleges this side of the Rockies, answered the call to Franklin Field today when the historic yearly University of Pennsylvania relay carnival opened. Seventy-three colleges and universities and 197 high and preparatory schools were represented. A great crowd, many of the number being from other cities, gathered at Franklin Field long before the first sharp pistol crack sent the first batch of runners off from

their marks.
National interest centered in the four-mile championship relay race for universities. Princeton, Northwestern, Pennsylvania, Ohio State, Pennsylvania State and the big Green runners from Dartmouth were called to start in this event. Slight odds were offered that Pennsylvania would repeat last year's great race and carry off the American relay title. Western colleges had a record representation in seven other four-mile relays. But the event that drew the greatest out-of-town crowd was the special match relay. Swatmore, Carlisle, Georgetown, Penn State, Fordham, Ohio Wesleyan and Western Polytechnic Institute being the contenders.
Among the Olympic champions who graced the occasion was Richards, the high jump title holder from Brigham University. High and preparatory events attracted the greatest attention today, aside from the special match relay races, as this, as usual was scholastic day.
