PROTEST SCORE AT WALLOWA

REPORTED JOSEPH AND WALLOWA CLUBS COMBINE.

Total of 117 Made Against Wallowa by Home Club Yesterday.

Protest at the manner of compiling scores at Wallowa have followed the telegraphic blue rock shoot yesterday when Wallowa is reported to have have registered 115 birds as compared to 117 in La Grande, but if rumor has it right, Wallowa, on State Secretary Bean's permission, they say, are counting the scores made at Joseph as well, and by that process registered a total of 120 yesterday. Protest were telegraphed to the state secretary at Eugene last night, on the grounds that Wallowa picks the best of her shots each shoot, and then picks the best made at Joseph, over another trap and by another club. The Wallowa score is reputed to be 115 and the combined scores of Joseph and Wallowa to be 120. The latter figure was turned into the state secretary. At home, the shooting was good, 117 registered against Wallowa and 116 against Bend, a tie-shoot. The Bend results have not been heard from.

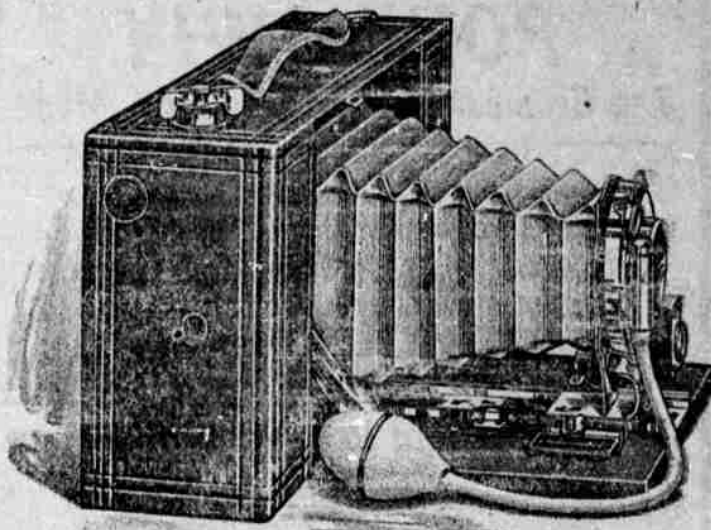
