Fancy Lot From Wallowa County for Local Consumers Arrives.

NEW POTATOES GO QUICKLY

New potatoes, selling at 2 pounds for 25 cents, were rapidly disposed of by local grocers and the supply was exhausted before the week was over, but hereafter it is likely that the new spuds will come more frequently and soon be regular offerings.

Fancy green-fed beeves of the Wallowa country are being served on La Grande tables—with proper trimmings of course. Idaho points, principally Nampa, have supplied several carloads during the winter and more are coming this week to local packers so that the demands in La Grande are far greater than the supply. The Wallowa shipment arrived last week. Packers are constantly on the lookout for out-of-country beef and at the fancy prices quoted for beef on the hoof, it is strange that more Union county ranchers do not devote their attention to the profitable business.

Spring lambs are due on the market in the course of six or seven weeks.

NOTICE OF SEWER IMPROVEMENT TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN.

You will hereby take notice that in pursuance of a resolution duly adopted by the council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, on the 26th day of March, 1913, creating sewer district No. 3, section 3, and designating and declaring the real property hereinafter described as included in and comprising said district, and in pursuance of a resolution duly adopted by said city council on the 3rd day of March, 1913, whereby said city council determined the necessity of and declared its intention to improve said district and all the real property included therein as hereinafter described, by laying therein a sewer and in pursuance of the report of the commissioners heretofore made in relation thereto, and adopted by said council, the city council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, will meet at the council chamber of said city on the 7th day of May, 1913, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. of said day, and consider the levy of a special assessment against all the real property benefited or affected by said proposed improvement, and grant a hearing before said council to all persons feeling aggrieved on account of said proposed levy of said special assessment to pay the costs and expenses thereof.

That the boundaries of the district to be benefited or affected by such proposed improvement are as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at a point on the center line of Third street 120 feet north of the north property line of L avenue and running thence west along the center of the alleys in blocks 81, 80 and 79 to the center line of Cedar street; thence south along the center line of Cedar street to a point 120 feet south of the south property line of L avenue, thence east along the center of the alleys in blocks 84, 83 and 82 to the center line of Third street to the place beginning.

Notice is hereby further given you that the said city council proposes to levy a special assessment on all of the property affected or benefited by such proposed improvement for the purpose of paying the costs and expenses of the same.
