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Bryan-Wilson Mediation Proves Fruitless

JOHNSON AND LEGISLATURE REFUSE TO SWERVE--"STAND PAT" AGAINST PRESIDENT'S ADVICES

SECRETARY OF STATE TO LEAVE SACRAMENTO HAVING FAILED TO ACCOMPLISH HIS PURPOSE, AND WILL VISIT SAN FRANCISCO TOMORROW.

CODE MESSAGE MAY HOLD LAST APPEAL OF WILSON

Governor Johnson and His Administration Would Not Dare to Give Up Their Original Purposes in Excluding Japanese--Senator Works Warns Administration Policies to Proceed With Care.

Washington April 29.—President Wilson is standing fully as "pat" as Governor Johnson on the anti-alien matter and insists the words "ineligible to citizenship" contained in the California bill, violates the treaty existing between Japan and the United States. This was the only announcement made at the White House today following a cabinet meeting when additional instructions to Col. Bryan were sent in code by telegraph. The cabinet reviewed Bryan's actions at Sacramento and declared he had done his duties perfectly.

Sacramento, April 29.—Governor Hiram Johnson and the legislators are standing pat, and the bill excluding aliens ineligible to citizenship from ownership of land, will be passed and the mission of Secretary of State Bryan will result in failure. This in a word is the situation in the Japanese embroglio so far as anyone can tell from the outside this morning.

During the forenoon the situation was halted pending receipt of a message from Washington in answer to telegrams sent by Bryan last night. It is expected Bryan will hear from the president during the morning hours and another conference with the legislature held.

Unless at this conference Bryan will be able to impress the legislators with the necessity of changes, it is not probable that further efforts will be made to block the objectionable California legislation.

Bryan's Itinerary Ready.
Arrangements are completed for the visit of Col. Bryan in San Francisco tomorrow. He will, according to the present plans, leave here at 8:13 tomorrow and remain in San Francisco until the following morning, the guest of Panama exposition officials. After being shown over the exposition grounds he will be entertained at a banquet. It is not certain, this noon, if he will return here or not, but will probably go to Washington direct.

After laying the cornerstone at the Y. M. C. A. building, Bryan received a long cipher message from Wilson, believed to be an answer to Bryan's reports on the attitude of the California legislature regarding the anti-alien laws. The message, it is said, contains further instructions for Bryan and another executive conference is expected during the day when Bryan will again take up the discussion of the alien legislation with the legislators.

President Shows Attention.
Washington, April 29.—President Wilson and John Bassett Moore, counsellor of the state department, conferred from 7 until 10 o'clock this morning over the alien bill. Two telegrams were received by the president last night from Bryan but their contents, or the contents of Wilson's answers have not been made public. It is understood the president and Moore attempted to answer every objection raised by the California legislators.

WORKS DEFENDS STATE
State Government Should Not and Must Not Coerce California.

Washington, April 29.—Defense of the stand taken by Governor Johnson and members of the California legislature, was voiced by Senator Works of California today. "Every state has the right to provide by law who will own its land and except aliens from this right. The national government has no right to enact any law or make any treaty either denying or impairing the rights of states," said the California senator.

"Governor Johnson and the California legislature are strictly within their rights when they insist on enacting the alien law, whether it excludes all or but one nation. If the government treaty infringes that right, the state is not bound to abide by its provisions. On the other hand

RICH CHICAGO ITALIAN MEETS DEATH THROUGH LOVE

Hatchet Matches Gun

When Band of Italians Attempt to Kidnap Girl, Fatalities Result.

Chicago, April 29.—Nearly decapitated by a hatchet in the hands of the girl's brother, Tony Marasato, a rich young Italian, was killed today when with a friend he attempted to kidnap Anne Forte, aged 19. She had rejected him. During the melee a bullet struck and fatally wounded Frank Alena a passerby. The girl was en route from work with her brother when they were set upon by the band. Marasato, drawing a gun, attempted to frighten Pasquello Forte but the latter seized a hatchet from a pile of lumber nearby and hacked his sister's foe before he could fire. Forte has fled.

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MINORITY IS MAKING FINAL TARIFF STAND

WILL CENTER STRENGTH AGAINST IMMEDIATE EFFECTIVE CAUSE OF BILL.

BUSINESS DESERVES TIME

Republicans See They Cannot Thwart Tariff Bill But Hope to Prevent the Bill Becoming a Law as Soon as Signed by the President—General Debate Closed and Amendments Heard.

Washington, April 29.—With general debate on the tariff bill closed the house began consideration of the Underwood measure for amendment today. Chairman Underwood insists he doesn't intend to impose gag rule but proposes to try allowing the five minutes debates to "run open" unless the minority attempts other tactics.

Minority Sees Defeat.
The minority admits there is no chance of amending the bill but they intend to wage a fight against the first paragraph which makes the bill effective the day after it is signed by the president.

Republicans contend the country's businessmen should be given time to regulate business to new conditions imposed by the Underwood bill and it shouldn't become effective for months.

The president has arranged for a conference next Thursday with western and southern senators who are opposed to his free wool and sugar plans.

FRIEDMANN INSTITUTE IN 36 STATES.

Washington, April 29.—Fusal to express an opinion the efficacy of the Friedmann treatment, was voiced by Dr. W. C. Rucker, assistant surgeon of the public health service. Dr. Rucker declared the services and activity regarding the supposed cure will be confined to bacteriological investigation to determine the safety of the serum. After his formal report he will have no further connection with the treatment. The government will have no authority of Friedmann institutes which will be established in 36 of the states.

PARKISON'S AIM EXPOSED

REFERENDUM MOVEMENT SIFTED TO THE BOTTOM.

First Step to Organize "Anti-Referendum on Schools" Club Taken.

Biting expose of the methods alleged to be prompting H. J. Parkison of Willamette Valley, to invoke the referendum on the University of Oregon appropriation, concise portrayal of the terribly congested conditions at Eugene, and a general review of the whole referendum situation were heard last evening by a handful of men and women voters at the Commercial club parlors when Miss Emma Wold of Portland lay before the audience in brief manner the Parkison-University squabble. The immediate result of the meeting was the appointment of a committee consisting of City Attorney J. P. Rusk, County School Superintendent E. E. Bragg, and Court Reporter H. R. Hanna to lay plans for the formation of a club to carry on the fight against Parkison crowd which is throwing the state into nearly as much expense for a special election as the amount involved represents, was set out by Miss Wold, representing the organization formed in Portland to oppose the referendum. She said:

The late legislature made some excellent provisions for the state educational institutions. Among them were two measures providing for a total appropriation of \$175,000 for a building and additions to buildings at the University of Oregon. No one questions the need of these buildings, no one charges extravagance in the plan for additional room there where already the last corner of the last basement has been cleared out for class rooms, where every class room is filled to overflowing, and the question of comfort and of decent air has to be regarded as nonexistent.

Now comes one H. J. Parkison and other souls dissatisfied with the educational system of the state, who propose a program by which the affairs of state education may be created to their fancy. In this program the first step is the invoking of the referendum on the \$175,000 appropriated for permanent improve-

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AUSTRIAN-MONTENEGRIN WAR CERTAIN

SPEEDY DECLARATION OF WAR BY EMPEROR JOSEPH IS BOTHERING EUROPE.

BALKAN STATE DEFENSIVE

Situation in Austria and Montenegro Over Scutari Becomes Alarming and all Europe May Become Involved in the Affair—Montenegrin Prince May Bombard Austrian City on Border.

Vienna, April 29.—Following a conference with Emperor Joseph tonight, Foreign Minister Von Cherkhold semi-officially stated Austria will deliver a 24-hour ultimatum to Montenegro tomorrow morning to evacuate Schrutari. If Montenegro has not evacuated by Thursday morning, Austria will immediately move troops across the frontier and formally declare war.

Vienna, April 29.—Speedy declaration of war between Austria and Montenegro is indicated in a statement by Emperor Franz Joseph in which he declares he is determined to worst Montegrins out of Scutari. Reports from Balkan states are alarming.

Prince Danilo of Monenegro is on the march to occupy hills dominating Cattao the Austrian city and it is reported he may bombard the place. Danilo also will be in a position to avoid Austrians landing at Antivari. There is much apprehension that the conflict will involve the rest of Europe.

London, April 29.—Unwilling to wait longer for the powers to act, Austria has announced she would take immediate and independent action against Montenegro and force King Nicholas to evacuate Scutari, according to Vienna dispatches to the London Daily Mail, which corroborate the report that an Austrian army was started yesterday toward Scutari.

PANKHURST'S HEALTH FAILS

OFFICIALS FIND HER TOO ILL TO RETURN.

Suffragette Leader Unable to Recover From Recent Hunger Strike.

London, April 29.—Superintendent Quinn from Scotland yard and a surgeon from Holloway prison where the recent hunger strike resulted in the collapse of Mrs. Pankhurst's health, visited the suffragette queen officially today and reported her to be too ill to return to the prison to finish the three-year sentence. Her health is frail and her recovery is in doubt.
