WATER HOLDS RATE CURATIVE

SENATOR E. E. KIDDLE POINTS
OUT DATA.

Need of Interesting Herself in Water
Rates Shown in Union County.

Island City, April 29.—(To the editor)—At the meeting of the Columbia & Snake River Waterways Association, held at Pendleton on April 14 and 15, the question came up: "Who will be benefitted by an open river?"

Some seem to think that only the towns and land lying adjacent to the river would derive a benefit, and the interior towns and country would receive very little benefit from water transportation.

I maintained that we should look at the matter from purely a business standpoint, and that business was a very cold-blooded proposition, and that sentiment counted for very little when it can up against the chase for the almighty dollar; and that, while the citizens of each state would like to remain loyal to their own state and do their business within the confines of their own state, still when someone offered them a fraction of a cent more for their produce, sentiment took a back seat, and the dollar mark won the day.

I stated that the matter of rates is really of small moment to the shipper from a personal standpoint, as under the present laws, all persons are guaranteed the same rate on shipments of like produce from the same points; and all produce is bought on the basis of the market value and freight rate—the competition being very keen, there is a very small margin left; and if the freight rate is reduced, prices are adjusted accordingly. The producer and consumer are the ones who are benefitted by cheaper rates, as in the case of reduction of rates, either the producer gets the benefit in increased price, or the consumer gets the benefit at the other end of the line in the decreased price of produce.

The principal shipments from Union and Wallawa counties are grain and livestock, and our railroad rates today to Seattle and Tacoma on these articles are not based on the mileage distance, but on the rate to Wallula, and the rate from Wallula to Tacoma and Seattle. The reason for this is competition, which is a proof of J. N. Teal's argument that the rates are a matter of competition and necessity, not distance; and I think there is no question that if Wallula and other river points get a cheaper rate, that we will get a benefit on same.

To show a few comparisons on what water transportation will do, will give a few figures on grain and flour rates:

Portland to Japan by water, a distance of about 6000 miles, 25c per hundred.

Portland to Boston by rail, about 3,000 miles, 79c per hundred.

The Dalles to Portland, 87 miles by water, 72c per hundred.

Union to Pendleton, 85 miles, by rail, 14c per hundred.

The opening of the Panama canal will undoubtedly make a readjustment of all rates to Atlantic coast and Mississippi Basin points, and the nearer we get water transportation, the better off we will be.

FELINE WHISKERS.

Delicate Nerve Signals That Guide the Lion in the Jungle.

Because a cat can go about so safely and rapidly in the dark without injury to himself or without running into things nearly every one believes it is due entirely to the fact that he sees with his eyes in the dark.

That a cat can see to a certain extent in the dark is quite true, but it is doubtful if he could go about so rapidly in total darkness were it not for his long whiskers. Note a cat's whiskers and you will see they are always as long, generally longer, as his head is wide, and a cat's head is as wide as his body.

These delicate hairs that project from the muzzle of the cat family are wonderful mechanisms. Each one grows from a follicle or gland nerve to the utmost sensibility. Its slightest contact with any obstacle is instantly felt by the animal, though the hair itself may be tough and insensible.

Consider the lion stalking through the jungle at night in search of prey, when the least stir of a twig gives alarm. The lion's whiskers indicate through the finest nerves any object that may be in his path. A touch stops him short before pushing through some close thicket where the rustling leaves and boughs would betray his presence. Wherever his head may be thrust without a warning from the vibrissa there his body may pass noiselessly. It is the aid given him by his whiskers, in conjunction with the soft cushions of his feet, that enables him to proceed as silently as the snake.—New York American.

ARABIA LIKES LOCUSTS.

Not Only the Natives but Everything Animal Eats Them.

Locusts are today eaten in Arabia pretty much as they were in Biblical times. Foreigners as well as natives declare that they are really an excellent article of diet. They are best boiled.

The long or "hopping" legs must be pulled off and the locust held by a wing and dipped into salt before it is eaten. As to flavor, the insect is said to taste like green wheat.

The red locust is more palatable than the green kind. Some say that the female is red and the male green, but others contend that all are green at first, whatever the sex.

Locusts must be caught in the morning, for then they are benumbed by the cold and their wings are damp with the dew, so that they cannot fly. They may be found in Arabia clustered in hundreds under the desert bushes, and they can be literally shoveled into a bag or basket.

Later the sun dries their wings and it is hard to catch them. When in flight they resemble what we call May flies. They fly sidewise, drifting, as it were, before the wind.

They devour everything vegetable and are devoured by everything animal—desert larks and bustards, ravens, hawks and buzzards like them. The camels munch them in with their food. The greyhounds run snapping after them all day long and eat as many as they catch. The Bedouins often give them to their horses.—Youth's Companion.

Made For Fat Men.

One of the narrow arches in the gallery of the chapel at Columbia university is not exactly symmetrical, although the defect is not noticeable to the casual observer. The reason for the widening of the arch after its original construction had rise in a somewhat humorous occurrence. One of the early visitors was a remarkably fat man, who found himself wedged into the arch when he tried to squeeze through and was extricated with some difficulty. The builders, recognizing the possibility of other fat people being numbered among the future visitors, decided to widen the arch, sacrificing symmetry and harmony to practical need, as the pier was so constructed as to bear no loss of width on one of its sides.—New York Globe.
