NOTICE OF SEWER IMPROVEMENT

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN. You will hereby take notice that in pursuance of a resolution duly adopted by the council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, on the 19th day of February, 1913, creating sewer district No. 3, section 1—A, and designating and declaring the real property hereinafter described as included in and comprising said district, and in pursuance of a resolution duly adopted by said city council on the 26th day of March, 1913, whereby said city council determined the necessity of and declared its intention to improve said district and all the real property included therein as hereinafter described by laying therein a sewer and in pursuance of the report of the commissioners heretofore made in relation thereto, and adopted by said council, the city council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, will meet at the council chamber of said city on the 7th day of May, 1913, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. of said day, and consider the levy of a special assessment against all the real property benefited or affected by said proposed improvement, and grant a hearing before said council to all persons feeling aggrieved on account of said proposed levy of said special assessment to pay the costs and expenses thereof.

That the boundaries of the district to be benefited or affected by such proposed improvement are as follows, to-wit: Beginning at the intersection of the center line of Adams avenue and the center line of Greenwood street and running thence south along the center line of Adams avenue to the east boundary line of Lyman's subdivision of block or lots 2, 3, 4, and 7 of Greenwood street, thence south along the said boundary line to the center line of Washington Avenue, thence north along the center line of Washington Ave., to the center line place of beginning. All in the city of La Grande, Union county, Oregon. Notice is hereby further given you that the said city council proposes to levy a special assessment on all of such proposed improvement for the purpose of paying the costs and expenses of the same. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$3289.16. If you have any remonstrance to make against said proposed improvement or the proposed levy of such special assessment or feel aggrieved against the same present the same in writing or appear in person with your witnesses and evidence before said council at the time and place above

specified, or be forever thereafter barred and foreclosed from making the same.
