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WILSON ANRY AT TREATMENT GIVEN REFORMS

GOES TO NEW JERSEY TO PERSONALLY WESTLE WITH THE FOES OF JURY REFORM.

SMITH DUE FOR FLAYING

Thoroughly Angered at The Opposition Meeting His Jury Reform Bill in His Home State, President Hurries to Scene of Battle to Lock Horns with Smith Faction Machine Holds Whiphand.

Washington, May 1.—President Wilson in the role of a fighting man, will be presented to residents of New Jersey tonight and tomorrow. Angered by opposition to his plan for jury reforms—formulated while he was governor of the state—is meeting in New Jersey, the president left New York at 3 o'clock this afternoon to lock horns with opponents of the measure. He is due to arrive in Newark at 7 o'clock and will make a speech there.

Red Hot Speeches Promised.

He made it plain before leaving Washington that the speeches he is about to make will be vitriolic in character and that he intends to roast former Senator Smith, and old-time enemy, to a nice brown turn. The machine combination which expects to control the special session of the legislature next week and defeat the bill which Wilson drafted. It is the president's aim to counteract what success the enemies in New Jersey have had to date.

The president openly declared he intended to defy the co-called non-partisan machine which he alleges has combined with the Smith machine to prevent the enactment by the legislature of the law reforming the state jury system. The president plans to speak at Elizabeth City tonight. On Friday he will speak at Jersey City and confer with the leaders of the legislature.

He expects to return to Washington midnight Friday. The president admits his wishes regarding the referendum vote probably will be disregarded.

Pomona Grange Passes Resolution Opposing School Referendum.

Pomona grange is heartily opposed to the university referendum. At its last meeting it passed the following resolution:

CONDUCTORS TALK STRIKE

Fifty-two Eastern Roads Jointly Refuse Higher Wage Petitions.

New York, May 1.—A strike of conductors and other trainmen on 52 eastern railroads, is threatened following the refusal of managers of the roads to grant demands for increased wages.

Further negotiations are expected. In a letter refusing the increase, the railroad managers detail their reasons. The letter declares if the roads are compelled to pay higher wages, the burden will fall on the public.

More Delay Over Anti Alien Laws

Sacramento, May 1.—Private influence which Secretary of State Bryan exerted upon Democratic members of the state senate proved today potent enough to again delay final action upon the Webb substitute bill for the Birdsall anti-alien land bill. The final word will be spoken in the senate tomorrow when the roll is called. Positively no more delay will be granted, according to statements on the floor of the senate today. Hesitation on the part of the progressive majority to use "steam roller" tactics enabled the Democrats to stave off another 24 hours the final action. It is believed the Democrats' aim is to give more time for Washington forces to exert influences.

Court Action Threatened. The first example of this influence came a little ahead of time when Governor Johnson received from the president a note conveying practically a threat that the Webb bill, if passed, would be taken before the United

States courts. Johnson's reply was courteous but non-committal. The bill is scheduled for action tomorrow at 11 o'clock.

Final decision in this matter was delayed on account of argument on another bill. Final roll call was to have taken place at 11 today, but was put off until 1 and then laid over until tomorrow.

Substitute Bill Worse. It was not until the legislators had had a full day to digest the Webb bill which is almost certain to pass, that they realized that it is by far the more drastic of any. By its provisions, purchase or ownership of land for agricultural purposes by any alien who is not eligible to citizenship under the federal treaty, is absolutely prohibited. Before the senate convened, Governor Johnson explained the whole keynote of the bill rests upon the federal doctrine that the Japanese upon all California agricultural to citizenship in this country. Bryan Visits Japanese Camps. In order to secure first hand knowledge of the encroachments of Japanese upon all California agricultural lands, Bryan, accompanied by Governor Johnson, left early this morning for the Japanese farm colony at Florin, 10 miles distant. He returned before the anti-alien bill was to come up in the senate.

Bill Still Discriminates. Washington, May 1.—The anti-alien land bill submitted to the California legislature by Attorney Webb, and to be adopted by the senate of that state as an amendment to the Birdsall bill, is still discriminatory and violates the terms of the treaty between the United States and Japan in the opinion of the president and his advisers.

It is understood, that if the bill FLY SWATTERS ON CRUSADE New York, May 1.—War-grom war to death—is on today throughout the length and breadth of the Nation. In every large city and many of the smaller ones the slaughter is on. No quarter will be shown, and the campaign will be carried on the same lines if it takes all summer, according to information from headquarters.

SUFFRAGETTES REMAIN FIRM Will Conduct Headquarters "Under Ground" and in France.

London, May 1.—After it was believed she had been arrested by the police raid on suffragette headquarters the other day, Miss Annie Keeney a militant leader, arriver from France today, and was immediately remanded to the Holloway prison where she is held without bail. "Underground" headquarters have been instituted by the militants.

passes, Viscount Chinda, the Japanese ambassador, will file a formal protest with the state department and it will be rushed to the higher courts. BAND RE-BORN ON NEW PLAN

COMMUNITY ORGANIZATION TO BE KEYNOTE

When Community Event is Celebrated, Band to be Gratis.

A community band is to be perfected out of the chaos created last fall when squabbles between union and non union musicians put the excellent band of last year into discord and for a time made no band at all. An organization meeting has been held in which tentative plans for a band that will meet the requirements, will be provided and local musicians, most of them business men and clerks, will select a leader who will give the needed instructions. The principle upon which the band is to be built is one that will appeal to the community at large.

The idea of pecuniary returns for the members of the band has been eliminated as far as possible. When individuals, fraternal or church organizations wish to employ the band, it will be at their disposal at commercial prices, or when the community has any reason for desiring a band's presence, the band will be on hand as a community band. When the members can attend any public or community function as a band without losing salaries for any of the musicians the band is to be available without costs. Band concerts are planned for summer evenings at no added expense to business, than that which will be needed to meet current expenses. Hereafter, should the plan work out, conventions, baseball opening days, or any similar community event, will have a band to supply such music as is demanded.

"I feel certain," said a business man interested in the band today, "that this plan will work to mutual benefit and will eliminate the sometimes prevalent opinion that the band members are in the band for the sole purpose of realizing fat pay checks. This notion has been exaggerated all along, but if the band on its new organization can find employment from time to time, the players will be reimbursed insofar as their own salaries in their respective line of business suffer."

ARMY LIFE ONE OF EASE, JOYS, SAYS CARNEGIE

WAR EQUIPMENT OF THIS NATION DERIDED AND RIDICULED IN SPEECH.

WAR ALMOST IMPOSSIBLE

No Danger of War With Any Other Nation Preval if This Government Will Treat Sister Nations With Justice and Friendliness Declares Philanthropist in St. Louis.

St. Louis, May 1.—In an address punctuated with satirical comment on the life of ease and tranquility enjoyed by the United States army and navy, and ridicule for those who are sponsors for militarism who see danger of war at every international controversy, Andrew Carnegie opened the fourth American peace congress today.

He paid his respects to the army and navy by declaring their vocations involving the least risks any man can enter in this day and age. He poohed the idea that any of the powers had the slightest desire to go to war with the United States. He declared there would never be an occasion for war if this country will simply treat all nations with justice; and friendliness.

Carnegie derided the possibility of there ever being war between the United States and Great Britain, Germany or France, giving reasons in each case.
