Examination Here May 24.
The U. S. Civil Service Commission
announces that a clerk-carrier exami-
nation will be held at La Grande, Ore-
gon, on May 24, 1913, to secure an
eligible register from which selection
may be made to fill vacancies as they
may occur in the La Grande post-
office. Both men and women will be
admitted to this examination. Age
limits are 18 to 45 years.
The postoffice department has ad-
vised that after July 1, 1913, the en-
trance salary in the postoffice service
in the first and second class offices
will be \$200 per annum, and that em-
ployees in the \$600 grade will be ad-
vanced to the \$800 grade.
Applicants should apply at once to
the local secretary, Board of Civil
Service Examiners at the La Grande
postoffice, or the Secretary, Eleventh
Civil Service District, Seattle, Wash.,
for application blank and full infor-
mation.
