## Grants Non-Suit in Vaughan Case

 After a day and a half, the plaintiff's case in the suit brought by the F. C. Vaughan Investment company against James Underwood and others, was finished in circuit court yesterday afternoon. At the conclusion a motion for non-suit was made by ex-Circuit Judge William Smith, one of the attorneys for the defense. The latter argued the motion for the defense and Charles P. Murphy for the plaintiff, he being the attorney for the Investment company. The motion of defendant's counsel for non-suit was granted by Judge Anderson following the lengthy arguments. Attorney Joseph Hellner acted with Judge Smith in conducting the defense.

## Debate is Won by Affirmative.

 The last of the high school semi-final debates was held at the library auditorium last evening a large attendance greeting the speakers in the last of the tryouts for the final contest which will decide the debating honors for the school for the current year.

The question debated was: Resolved That the Fifteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States should be abolished. The negative side was upheld by Sidney Elms, Chester Gardner and John Bisher, and the affirmative by Misses Ruth Dunbabin, Angeline Jenkins and I. B. Brown, Jr. The discussion of the question, which is relative to the franchise rights of the negro, showed much study and work on the part of all and both sides are entitled to all credit for their showing. The decision of the judges was in favor of the affirmative team, whose three members were also chosen as the three individual winners of the evening.

Prof. W. W. Williams presided at the meeting and the judges were Attorney F. L. L. Hubbard, Prof. F. J. Hilton and Prof. J. A. Goodwin.

## Childers Not Yet Arraigned.

 Suit for divorce was filed yesterday by Mary Edens, who seeks separation from her husband, Sherman W. Edens. They were married at Lenanus, Mo., Nov. 21, 1907, and according to the complaint in April, 1911, the husband began a course of cruel and inhuman treatment, beating his wife and compelling her to do hard manual labor that ruined her health. The complaint asked the court to order the defendant to provide suit money and expenses for the plaintiff and two children during the suit and Circuit Judge Anderson made an order in accordance with the terms of the complaint, so that the husband, who has the means, must furnish funds. The wife asks for the custody of the children.

## Military Body Fades Into History.

 Like the passing of an old land mark, was the shipping of the property belonging to disbanded Company "A" today. Guns, knapsacks, tents, blankets, ammunition, uniforms and in fact everything belonging to the militia was sent to Portland.

In 1889 Company "A" was organized with a roster of about 70 members. E. H. Mix was the first captain. He was succeeded by John Shields and later W. S. Bowers took command. Isador Fuchs was the next captain, resigning to go to Cripple Creek. Later the company was mustered out, only to be reorganized by Samuel White, who was at the head of the men until he went to Portland when Captain Robert Haines assumed the leadership, later giving way to Captain C. H. McCulloch.
