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PIONEER OF 62 SUCCOMBS

MRS. JONAS DICKEY, LONG A LA GRANDER, DEAD.

Funeral Takes Place From Local Church This Afternoon.

Remains of Mrs. Jonas Dickey, a pioneer of 1862 in this valley, who died in Portland Saturday night, were brought to La Grande this morning, and interment occurred from the Baptist church this afternoon at 2 o'clock. Among those here to attend the funeral were: Mrs. David Bay, of Portland, Mr. Dickey the widower, has daughter, Mrs. Tom Boynton of Portland, William Baker and wife of Summerville, Martha Watson of Kamela, Bert Watson.

Melissa A. Baker was born in Hancock county, Illinois, in 1834. While young she moved with her parents to Iowa, and in 1857 was married to Jonas W. Dickey. In 1862 she and her husband, together with some of their friends and relatives, crossed the plains and settled in Grande Ronde valley. Mr. and Mrs. Dickey were for many years residents of La Grande, but about 1900 moved to Baker City where in 1906 they celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. Since leaving Baker City about four years ago they have been residents of California until last fall when they moved to the city of Portland.

Mrs. Dickey was the eldest of a family of ten children, three of whom are still living, John Baker of this city, William Baker of Summerville, and Sam Baker of Portland. The deceased was a sister to Mrs. A. C. Huntington, Hon. M. Baker, Mrs. Martha Watson, and Mrs. Charles Hadley, all of whom were well known in La Grande. Mrs. Dickey was a member of the Baptist church all her life, taking an active part in the affairs of that church in La Grande for many years. Among her Sunday school scholars were Jap Stevens, J. D. Slater, W. Slater, James Stots, Chas. and William Morrow, Archie Webb, W. W. Baker, Frank Baker, and Sam Chenoweth.

NEW POLICY INAUGURATED

Department of Commerce in Cabinet to Broaden Out.

Washington, May 5.—The president proposes to make the department on commerce a substitute for "Dollar diplomacy." He intends to broaden its scope to develop American trade abroad and remove the suspicions that the department is a political adjunct. The president has made this plain to a conference of newspaper correspondents today.

The administration is "marking time" until the return of Bryan before commenting on the anti-alien law. The president has received the full text of the bill by telegraph and a copy has been sent to John Bassett Moore, counselor of the state department of commerce a substitute for aspects.

POSTMAN FINDS BOMB

English Militant Suspected of Planting Bomb in Postoffice.

London, May 5.—The lives of 200 women were jeopardized today when a nitro glycerine bomb was found among parcels of the Southwestern district postoffice. Militant suffragettes are suspected. The bomb was discovered by mail sorters and was filled with enough explosive to have blown the building to atoms.
