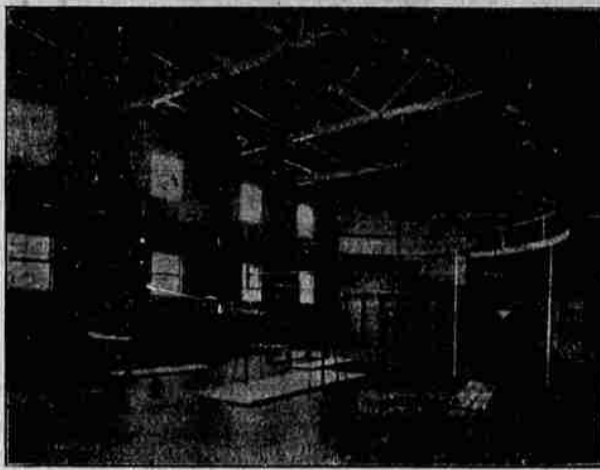
Baker Visits Eugene.
