E. STEINCAMP DIED IN EAST

FORMER LA GRANDE PHYSICIAN TO BE BURIED HERE.

Word Has Come That Remains of Late Sumpter Man to Come Here.

Remains of the late Dr. E. Steincamp, a resident of Sumpter, but for many years a resident of La Grande, who died in Toledo, Ohio, early in the week, are said to be en route to La Grande for burial. Neither the local undertakers or the Masonic lodge know anything about funeral arrangements however, and it is likely that both will be instructed further within the next 24 hours.

Dr. Steincamp was cashier of the First National bank of Sumpter for six years previous to his death. He was Past Grand Master of the McEwen lodge A. F. & A. M. at Sumpter and a member of the local chapter there of the Eastern Star.

He was 35 years old and prior to his residence in Sumpter was in the drug business in Granite, where he also had an extensive practice as a physician.

Upon moving to Oregon from his home in Toledo, Dr. Steincamp settled in La Grande and for a number of years was engaged in the practice of his profession, and owned property here at the time of his death.

He was a devout member of the Presbyterian church.

He is survived by his wife, who wih him at the time of his death and his mother, sister and brother who live in Toledo.

Dr. Steincamp is well known in Baker and his wife is a sister of Guy L. Yinsay of Baker, with whom they visited quite often.
