**FITCHNER IS WILD BUT WINS**

LA GRANDE WINS AND LOSES IN TWO-GAME SERIES.

Moeller Charged With Losing Own Game—Fitchner Walks 10.

 Pendleton, Ore., May 12.—Pendleton and La Grande split even on a double header here Sunday. Pendleton taking the morning game 10 to 2 and La Grande the afternoon game 11 to 6. Good pitching on the one side with good support and poor pitching on the other with poor support tells the story of both games. Osborne proved too much for the Spuds in the first affair and Fitchner was the undoing of the Bucks in the second despite the fact that he walked ten men.

Moeller twirled for the visitors in the morning and lost his own game by issuing passes liberally, and contributing wild pitches and errors. It was a two to two game up until the fifth when the Bucks got to him.

The afternoon game belonged to neither team until the ninth, when La Grande bounced Berger for four runs. Up until the fifth it was one and one, but the Spuds took the lead then by chasing two across. Pendleton came back in the sixth and put three across. Then in the seventh, Krause went to the bad, and after three had scored, Berger was sent in. Before he settled down, another had registered. In the eighth Fitchner went wild and two Bucks rung the bell, making the score 7 to 6. In the ninth, four straight hits and a sacrifice scored four for La Grande.
